

Redondo Beehaws... 143 Bay League Opponents... 0

After almost 50 years of lightweight football competition in the Bay League, the Redondo Beehaws zeroed in on five opponents for its most successful campaign in history.

The Hawks blanked Hawthorne, 32-0, Friday afternoon and in so doing culminated an all-winning 9-game campaign. They registered a 32-0 shutout over Mira Costa, 13-0 over Santa Monica, 33-0 over South and 33-0 over Palos Verdes for an unprecedented 143 points to their opponents' "zero."

Halfback Jon Eno, a junior, scored two touchdowns against Hawthorne to set a school record of 14 touchdowns for one season.

Four practice victories included a 19-7 win over un-

beaten Pioneer League champion Torrance. The Tarbabes TD came on a pass interception, and one other by Lennox came on a run of a Redondo fumble. The Redondo "defense" was not scored upon in a single game, accounting for seven shutouts for the year for Coach Nick Aegerter.

Santa Monica won the Cee title with 13-12 win over Mira Costa in the final second of the game. Santa Monica also beat Redondo, 7-6, for the Beehaws' only loss. Redondo's Cees beat Hawthorne in their finale, 40-7.

South Threatens, But Loses to PV

Until South gambled and lost in the late third quarter of its Bay League football swan song with Palos Verdes Friday, it looked like the Spartans might pull a Pulitzer-prize upset. The Sea Kings took advantage of the break to win, 13-7, in a P.V. homecoming day game.

The victory gave Palos Verdes a 4-1 league record, the same as Hawthorne which kyoed Redondo, 27-3, in their wind-up at Hawthorne.

Hawthorne was given a reprieve from its early season 13-7 loss to Palos Verdes and was invited to play Santa Barbara in the CIF playoffs next week. Palos Verdes meets Long Beach Poly in the same event.

The play Palos Verdes can be thankful for in its game with South went like this: South was a yard short of a first down on its own 20 yard line with a third down call coming up. Instead of driving straight ahead (normal call), Steve Schmitz took a pitchout and was thrown for a 5 yard loss.

From the 15 the Spartans went into punt formation, but two P.V. boys jumped off sides, so the ball came back to the 20, with still a yard to go on fourth down.

Contrary to kicking "with the wind" at this late stage of the third period, the try for a first down was attempted and failed. Palos Verdes used six plays to score. South got as far as the Palos Verdes 35 in the fourth period before giving up the ball on downs, and a few moments later Palos Verdes kicked out of danger with the ball traveling 60 yards to the South 12.

With time running out in the game Palos Verdes moved close to a third touchdown. The Sea Kings, even at this stage, were not content with playing it safe and called three timeouts in an attempt to score from inside the 20, but failed.

South led 7-0 in the first quarter on a 22 yard run by Steve Phillips, the culmination of a 65 yard drive.

Quarterback Bruce Berger, who scored both P.V. touchdowns, used a rollout for a second quarter score from 9 yards out, and put the winning touchdown on the boards with a 2 yard charge.

In the C-game Torrance backed into a three-way tie with Aviation and West High by tripping Lennox, 26-9.





El Segundo Rally Overcomes West

El Segundo claimed undisputed possession of the Pioneer League flag Friday evening, defeating West High, 25-14, in a game played at Warrior Stadium.

The Eagles had to come from behind to avoid sharing a part of the title with Lawndale, which defeated Aviation, 54-13. El Segundo had a perfect 5-0 Pioneer League record and was 6-3 on the season.

West High started Friday's game off with a bang when quarterback Dennis Dodd hit Gary Lloyd with a pass that went for 60 yards and a touchdown on the first play of the game. Dave LaRoche scored the extra point on a place kick.

With Ron Sells at the helm in the second quarter, the Warriors scored on the same pass play—Sells to Lloyd—for 41 yards. The touchdown was set up when Steve Parton intercepted an Eagle pass and returned it 44 yards.

El Segundo scored twice in the second quarter and twice in the third quarter to get its 25 points. Mark Smith scored first on a sneak from the one-foot line, then connected on a 12-yard pass to Bill Sligar for the second touchdown. Sligar scored the extra point on a pass.

David Goetz, running from the halfback spot, scored for the Eagles in the third quarter, going into the end zone from the one-yard line. The final 'Gundo score came on a pass interception by Bennie Powell, ran 42 yards for the touchdown.

West High finished the season with two victories and seven losses. The wins, both in the practice round, were at the expense of Palos Verdes and Bell Gardens.
