FEED your holiday guests savory roast turkey and packaged dressing mix. Remember that today's turkeys come in all sizes and shapes to suit your individual needs.

STUFF IT TOO!
Prepare Holiday Bird by Latest Findings

When deciding on the menu for family and guests for Thanksgiving remember that the traditional bird is the turkey and it comes in a variety of shapes and sizes to suit your individual needs.

Today's bird is a far cry from the starchy one found by the Pilgrims so long ago. They were grateful for it in all its toughness. How much more grateful we should be when the eating is elegant.

Rinse turkey and pat dry. Rub inside with salt, when roasting unstuffed. Do not salt if bird is to be stuffed.

Fill neck cavity lightly with stuffing. Fasten neck skin to back with skewer. Stuff body cavity lightly. Fasten opening with skewers. Leave legs free to permit deep heat penetration to thigh joint.

Fasten wings to body using skewers or string. Brush entire bird with shortening, oil or butter.

Breast Side Up
Place turkey on a rack, breast up, in shallow roasting pan. Insert meat thermometer into thickest part of thigh. Roast at 325 degrees until thermometer registers 185 degrees.

Place a sheet of aluminum foil loosely over the bird when the turkey has started to brown.

Breast Side Down
Or you may roast turkey breast side down. Place turkey on rack breast down in shallow roasting pan. Insert meat thermometer in thickest part of breast muscle.

Put thermometer half way in between the wing socket and the peak of the wishbone, parallel to the back bone. Roast at 325 degrees until thermometer registers 175 degrees.

Place a sheet of aluminum foil loosely over back when turkey has golden brown color. For added color in the breast, turn the turkey breast up when thermometer registers 175 degrees and roast another 30 minutes.

For birds weighing more than 24 pounds, roast at 300 degrees. Plan to have your bird done about 30 to 40 minutes before carving time. This allows the meat juices to be absorbed before carving.

Packaged Dressing Mix
In order to be one step ahead of the holiday rush, many homemakers will take advantage of convenience foods such as packaged dressing mix for quick and easy turkey stuffings and side-dish dressing casseroles.

For interest, why not stuff your turkey with one type of dressing and prepare a different side-dish dressing baked in muffin tins?

CASHEW DRESSING BALLS
2 bags (6 1/2 oz. each) Mrs. Cubbison's All Purpose or Cornbread Dressing
1 cup melted butter
1 cup chopped celery
1 cup chopped cashews
1/4 cup chopped parsley
1 1/2 cups water or broth

Blend dressing with melted butter. Add celery, nuts and parsley. Add water or broth. Mix well but lightly.

Scoop dressing into greased cups, cover with foil and bake at 325 degrees for 25 to 35 minutes.
