Junior Citizens Rate Their Day Big Success

What did this year's participants gain from Junior Citizens' Day? Before departing for a bout with some homework, the student mayor admonished citizens to "stick around these men" before criticizing city officials.

Speaking for the 125 students who exchanged places with city officials for the day, Ronald Gordon, a West High student, told the "senior citizens" the students had "the opportunity to see the manner in which human wisdom is devoted to the difficult task of providing for human wants."

Gordon took his theme from Edmund Burke, who defined government as "a contrivance of human wisdom to provide for human wants."

Chief observations of the day, Gordon said, had been the complex nature of municipal government, responsiveness of city government, the devotion of city officials, and the need to strengthen local government.

"If measured only in terms of what it has taught us, this day is a success, Gordon said.

Similar sentiments were expressed by Alan Luger, South High student body president who took over the mayor's chair for the day. Luger said he "learned a great deal, and found out I didn't know much."

Leader of Church to Speak Here

All three were taken into custody and booked on charges of suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon at the Torrance Police Station.



