# Traditional Cookie Exchange, Party Held by Mothers Club

Mothers Club of the Lutheran Church of the Resurrection, following a tradition established several years ago, entertained at their annual "Cookie Exchange" and Christmas party Monday evening at the Hollywood Riviera home of Mrs. Marvin Rygh with Mrs. Wayne Queen as co-hostess.

Mrs. J. Ralph Black is president of the group, whose members are mothers with children six years of age and under. The devotional was conducted by Mrs. Bob Newcomb following a short business meeting.

Mrs. T. Setzer gave the program for the evening when she described Christmas in Germany, its customs and traditions. "Secret Sisters" were revealed, and new ones selected for the coming year.

During the social hour, refreshments were served from a beautifully decorated Christmas table. It was at this time that cookies and favorite recipes were exchanged. Each member had made several dozen of her favorite holiday delicacies to exchange with other members as well as the recipes.

Several of these popular cookie recipes are being printed to share with Press-Herald readers.

**HIORTETAKK**  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup cream  
1/2 cup butter  
1 tsp. lemon peel  
1 cup lemon juice (fresh)  
2 drops almond extract  
1 1/2 cup flour  
1/2 tsp. Ammonium Carbonate  
1/4 tsp. cardamom

Whip eggs and sugar. Partially melt butter and stir into the egg-sugar mixture. Add the lemon juice, peel and almond drops. Sift in flour with ammonium carbonate and cardamom and blend all together.

Cover the dough and let it set in the refrigerator until next day. Then roll it out on a floured board to about pencil thick rolls. Cut in 4 inch lengths and form into rings, ends crossing each other.

Bake the rings in lard until light brown color and drain them on paper towels on a rack.

**PFEFFERNEUSSE FRUIT CAKES**  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup butter

1/2 cup dark corn syrup  
1/2 cup coffee  
1/2 cup candied cherries  
1 cup sordista raisins  
1/2 cup walnuts  
1/2 tsp. soda  
1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. nutmeg  
2 eggs (unbeaten)  
1 tsp. anise extract

In a three quart sauce pan combine sugar, butter, syrup, coffee. Simmer 5 minutes. Sift together flour, soda, cinnamon, salt, nutmeg. Grind cherries, raisins, walnuts. Set aside. Add two unbeaten eggs, and extract to sugar-butter mixture; mix well. Stir in dry ingredients, then flour mixture. Chill four hours or overnight. Shape into one inch balls with floured hands. Place on greased cookie sheet and bake at 350 degrees for 15 to 18 minutes. Makes about 6 dozen cookies.

**CHERRY TWINKLES**  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 egg yolk (beaten)  
1 tsp. orange rind (strained)  
1 tsp. lemon peel  
1 tsp. lemon juice  
1/2 cup flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 egg white (beaten)  
1 cup chopped walnuts  
1/2 cup candied cherries

Cream shortening and sugar thoroughly. Add yolk, peels and lemon juice. Mix well. Stir in flour and salt. (Continued on B-2)
