

Aerona Orders, Sales Hit High

Unfilled orders have hit the highest mark in Aerona Manufacturing Corporation's 35-year history and sales during 1964 will reach \$36 million, according to S. J. Kuderer, president.

Backlog orders now on the company's book, including follow-on orders and orders in negotiation, total more than \$47 million. This is a jump of 55 per cent over the \$30,600,000 reported at the end of 1963.

The \$36 million expected sales for this year surpasses last year's total by nearly \$8 million and exceeds the previous high of nearly \$35,600,000 in 1961.

KUDERER CREDITED the sales jump to a reorganization of the marketing responsibilities made in the latter part of 1963. Each division now has full authority and responsibility for its

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Bonelli Calls for New Juvenile Commission

"The time is ripe; the circumstances warrant immediate action."

So said Supervisor Frank G. Bonelli as he continued his push for the early creation of a county Juvenile Delinquency and Crime Commission.

Bonelli has asked for the formation of an 11-member lay commission with each member of the Board of Supervisors naming two members. The outgoing foreman of the Grand Jury would also be a member of the commission.

"The commission would not interest itself in individual

crimes," Bonelli said, "except where it might establish a system or general pattern of crimes."

The supervisor said the U.S. Senate Crime Commission, on the basis of observations of the functioning of lay citizen crime commissions, had recommended formation of the juvenile commission.

The membership of the juvenile crime commission should be representative of the "best citizens," Bonelli said, and should not include anyone holding or seeking political office. Persons identified with the general field

of law enforcement should not be included, he added.

Balloons Help Students Learn About Mountains

Students at Walteria School have taken to blowing up balloons in the classroom.

To much partying? A new dental experiment? Wrong, both times. Try a scientific experiment.

Right! Science students in a team-teaching class conducted by Mrs. Jean Meagher and Mrs. Elinor Courtney used the balloons to discover how mountains are formed.

Using shellac, the students painted continents on the balloons, which represented the ocean. Then, as the air escaped from the balloons the students watched the cracks and crevices forming in the shellac and the continents actually changed shape.

The experiment, part of a study unit on how the earth was formed, help the students to understand what took place when the earth's center began cooling millions of years ago, forming the mountains and other features of the earth's surface.


