

## Approve Driver Training Plan for Handicapped

A three-year pilot project to develop techniques for teaching physically handicapped high school students how to drive will be conducted by the Los Angeles City Schools, following approval by the Board of Education.

The program, the first of its kind in California, will be held at three schools: Miller High in Redondo, and the downtown Gardena branches of Widney High School.

A federal research and development grant which would pay about \$90,000 of the expected \$110,000 three-year cost of the project will be sought by the local district. The State of California is expected to pay most of the remaining costs.

Superintendent of Schools Jack P. Crowther said purpose of the research by the district's Safety and Driver Instruction Section will be to develop techniques for providing specialized behind-the-wheel training for physically handicapped students.

At present Los Angeles provides these students with the 10-week driver education program in the classroom which all students receive.

It has not been able to give them the followup instruction in dual control automobiles and driving simulators because special equipment and teaching techniques have not been developed.
