

# Nation's Road Builders Taking Cues from Abroad

There are more than 3.6 million miles of roads and streets in this country, which is proof enough that we have a great many talented highway engineers and builders who have done a remarkable job. Yet, U.S. road builders can still learn from highway research and developments in other countries. Much of our nation's knowledge is available to foreign engineers through the technical and trade press, but not too much news of foreign development is normally available to American engineers.

An initial study last year revealed that in four European countries alone there were 278 highway research projects virtually unknown here. A group of experts has gone overseas to study and catalog 1,000 highway research projects. Two unusual projects concern an infrared heating device to remove snow and ice from roads, and new techniques for measuring the slipperiness of a highway.

Perhaps the combined knowledge and inspiration from people all over the world will help to reduce the tragic losses of highway accidents.

**NEW DIESEL POWER**—The first of a new type of diesel locomotive that eventually may replace many of the conventional diesels now in operation has been built and delivered by Alco Products, Inc., a Worthington Corporation subsidiary that has been building locomotives for 117 years.

The new locomotive — the first of its kind designed and sold by an American manufacturer — is the 3,000-horsepower Century 630. A six-axle heavy weight of 350,000 pounds, it ranks as the most powerful single-engine diesel in operation today.

Its most distinguishing feature is a new electrical transmission system with an AC alternator in place of the conventional DC generator. Chief advantages claimed are smaller size, greater reliability,

and lower maintenance. These advantages are said to be especially significant in locomotives with 3,000 horsepower and up, because a standard generator capable of handling this much power would be so large as to require an increase in overall locomotive size. The AC system opens the way to even greater increases in locomotive power, according to Alco.

**BITS O' BUSINESS**—A new synthetic fiber reported to be almost indistinguishable from linen may sell for only half the price of linen. . . . To help promote its own car exports, Japan will soon ease some of its own quota restrictions on automobile imports. . . . Shipments by toy manufacturers set a new record in the first half, with a gain of 17.6 per cent over last year. . . . U. S. Steel plans to double its capital spending to \$1.8 billion during the next three years. Big Steel also hopes to effect a capital reorganization that would involve converting the preferred stock into debentures. . . . Several thousand 1966 model cars have already been turned out. Chevrolet and Mustang were the last to close down assembly lines on the 1965 models.

**BUILDING PRODUCTS UPGRADED**—The 1965 Housing Act, signed Aug. 10 by President Johnson, has already produced early forecasts for the 1966 building and construction industry. Some builders say that new home starts will jump two per cent plus because of the liberalized FHA regulations. But quality, too, will be on the increase. Officials note that prospective homeowners will be looking for and demanding quality items because they will be able to afford better homes more easily than ever before. And, too, manufacturers of building materials are continually upgrading their products, partially as a result of government encouragement. A government standards committee earlier this year urged trade associations to adopt inde-

pendently administered certification programs, such as that put into effect April 1 by the domestic ceramic tile industry.

The Tile Council of America, trade association for the nation's ceramic tile manufacturers, said that its quality-rating program was initiated because "consumers are learning to rely on certificates of quality as they have trademarks." More and more industries are participating in such programs and these grading systems generally call for the use of easily recognizable labels, such as the triangular certification mark of the domestic tile industry.

## Eshelman Ave. Lomita to Begin Road Expansion

Letters will be in the mail soon notifying property owners on Eshelman Avenue of the City of Lomita's expanded street improvement program.

This cooperative program between property owners and the city will provide curbs, gutters and sidewalks where they are lacking, reconstruction or resurfacing of pavement where necessary and new pavement construction to fill in the new curbs will now be available to all property owners on Eshelman Avenue, between 240th Street on the north and 262nd Street on the south.

Eshelman Avenue has been selected as one of the most important streets in Lomita for traffic circulation and thereby qualifies for gas tax funds.

Property owners are being asked to pay a maximum of \$2.50 per lineal foot for the installation of curb, gutter and sidewalk and the city will pay any expenditure in excess of that amount.

The city will pave-out the existing paved street to the curb line, and will pay for all necessary survey, design, staking and inspection as well as the required title search and preparation of deed for necessary right of way. Relocation of utilities and traffic lighting signals where necessary will be taken care of by the city, too.

**PROPERTY OWNERS** are asked to pay for two-thirds of the installation cost of the required concrete driveway for residential usage with the city paying the balance.

To ease the financial burden to the property owner, the city will advance the funds for the project and if repaid within 30 days after completion no interest will be charged.
