First Report For Chamber Drive Given

Completion of tabulations Monday, of first reports turned in by co-chairmen and team members in the seven business groups of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce budget campaign to finance the "Keep Pace with Opportunity" program, showed \$2,410 added, bringing cumulative total to \$42,859. As the campaign opened last Wednesday, the chamber had 526 member - accounts totaling \$40,449 annually.

The additional \$2,410 included 19 annual subscriptions by four new members and 15 "old" member increases. A "challenge goal" of \$60,125 and minimum goal of \$54,375 has been set by the board of directors.

A second report luncheon of the business groups division, of which Martin J. Denn and Leonard A. Ensminger are co-chairman, was scheduled today. The 27-man special prospects committee, headed by G. S. Williamson and Harry L. Weaver as co-chairmen, met yesterday for its second report session. This committee is contacting the larger member-firms for their adequate and proportionate annual investments in the expanded program.

IN OTHER matters, the council:

- Granted a request by North American Aviation to use four trailers as temporary office space at the firm's Torrance facility.

- Continued for 30 days the second reading of an ordinance which increases license fees for vending machines. The ordinance was voted when representatives of juke box owners appeared to protest the proposed hike in fees.

- Ordered the Park and Recreation Commission to re-study a plan to install lights on the La Romeria Park baseball diamond when residents appeared to protest installation of the lights.
