JA Holds Training Sessions

Adult advisers for 29 Junior Achievement companies in the southwest area of Los Angeles have launched a series of three-evening training courses at JA's Southwest Business Center, 14234 South Prairie Avenue in Hawthorne.

The sessions began on Sept. 7 and will continue through Sept. 27. Advisers will attend three two-hour training meetings during this period, to prepare them for their duties as business consultants to the miniature JA companies.

Eighty-nine volunteer adults representing Centinela Valley business and industry will take part in the training. Each Junior Achievement company will have at least three advisers; one each in sales, production, and management. At the training sessions the advisers will learn the way Junior Achievement companies are organized and the proven methods of success in aiding teenagers to operate a miniature business.

THE TRAINING sessions are preliminary to the actual organization of the JA companies. The learn-by-doing program will officially get under way Oct. 11, with 29 junior enterprises meeting one of four nights, Monday through Thursday.

Actual training will be conducted by Melvin J. Brown, manager of Junior Achievement's Southwest Business Center.

This year's Junior Achievement advisers represent more than 165 local industrial firms who will counsel JA companies during the coming program year.
