



OLD DAIRY SITE . . . The Artesia Boulevard site of Verburg Dairy has taken on a new look in recent months as owner Clara Verburg continues development of a 200-apartment complex. The first 40 units, separated by wide courtyards, have been completed and construction of another 55 units is under way. The balanced power apartments are located at 2059 W. Artesia Boulevard on land once occupied by one of area's largest dairies.

Verburg Dairy Gives Way To New Apartment Complex

Bill Verburg started a dairy 20 years ago that became one of the largest in the Torrance area. If flourished until his death in 1960, when his wife, Clara, took over its management. Since that time, open land has given way to subdivisions until the dairy was virtually surrounded by residential communities. Mrs. Verburg was well aware of the changing pattern and decided that while she wanted to retain the land, she also wanted to develop it so that it would be an asset to the community.

"Verburg Gardens," named in honor of her late husband, is the result of her decision, after much checking and meetings with the Torrance City Council and Planning Commission.

BUILT AND designed by Don Elder and Associates of Torrance "Verburg Gardens" is a modern, two-storied Balanced Power apartment complex spreading over five and a half acres at 2059 W. Artesia Blvd.

First 40 units of a total 200 apartments planned are now now under construction. One and two-bedroom models

are offered, furnished or unfurnished, and all with draperies and carpeting throughout the living areas.

Adhering to the Balanced Power concept, each unit has a built-in gas range and oven, hot water is supplied from a central gas-fired system and space heating is from gas-fired units.

SPECIAL features include wood paneling, full mirrored wardrobe doors and private patios or balconies for each apartment. Wide, beautifully landscaped courtyards separate each structure and a large, heated swimming pool and sun deck are provided for the convenience of tenants and their guests.

Exterior is accented with Italian marble facing imported from Florence especially for Verburg Gardens. Entry to the project features Travertine tile and black drift-stone decorative walls are focal points in the landscaped areas.

Complex is located near El Camino College approximately midway between the San Diego and Harbor freeways. Major shopping centers are nearby and the beaches are only minutes away.

Construction to Begin at North, South High Schools

Construction of two new high school classroom buildings will get under way in Torrance tomorrow when work begins on additions at North and South high schools. The two-story structures will house 11 classrooms and provide storage, workroom, and locker space. Architect is Donley, Bundy, and Associates of Los Angeles. Kelly Corp. of Anaheim is the contractor. Built at a cost of \$633,300, the buildings will be ready for occupancy in Sept. 1966. The North High building will be located just south of the present two-story classroom building, and the South High structure will be built just north of the present row of two-story classroom

'Forgiveness' Is Topic at Unity Church


"Adventure in Forgiveness" will be the subject of today's lesson at the Unity Church of Christianity.
