SEEK THIRD WIN

West Favored Over Lancers

Bell Gardens High School, last place finisher in last year's Rio Hondo League campaign, will send a young football team to town Friday to take on West High.

The game will be played in Warrior Stadium at 8 p.m.

Lancer coach Mike Kuglenski is building this year after finishing in 1964 with an 0-8-1 record. Among his losses in 1964 was a 6-0 defeat at the hands of West High.

Tom Peacock, described as a "fair passer" will quarterback Bell Gardens. Operating from a Wing-T, Peacock can be expected to throw the football.

But, warns Bell Gardens Athletic Director Gene Goebel, the Lancers will try to balance their offense. Halfbacks Paul Hebert and Dominic Gadena and fullback Mike Mowery can run.

At West, meanwhile, Coach Fred Peterson has been looking at last week's films and is making some changes in his backfield. Paul Gadbois has been moved onto the first unit, replacing Fred Schwanbeck at left half. Gary Singleton, who provided the interference for some long runs against Torrance last week, has drawn the starting assignment at fullback. Jim Barnes is expected to be at right half with Ron Norman at the helm.

The Warriors rate favorites in the contest, having chalked up 31-14 and 21-0 wins over Rolling Hills and Torrance while Bell Gardens has yet to score in the new season. San Gabriel Mission skunked the Lancers, 13-0, in the opener, and last week Artesia posted a 21-0 victory.

Peterson's biggest worry will be a possible let down after West's victory over Torrance.

But, he says, "We won't lay down."

A week after Coach Don Young's Lennox eleven played a good game against Culver City, the team was humiliated by Bishop Montgomery of Torrance, 39-0.

Culver City had to battle from behind to beat Lennox, 12-7, and it was Culver City that held potent Mira Costa to a 14-14 deadlock.

As Torrance's John Trantham takes a gander at these comparison scores, he may wonder how his Tartars fit into the picture. They have been beaten by Redondo, 14-0, and West, 21-0.

The Tartars may have had an excuse against West, what with first string quarterback Jeff Tonkel unable to play.

But everybody else in the Tartar backfield except Terry Tiedeman was completely bottled up by West.

Tailback Rick Faeth has not been able to jell for Torrance, and the team's big line has not stopped the opposition from running to the outside.

Both Torrance and Lennox competed in the Pioneer League the past couple years, but Torrance has switched to the Sky League so Saturday's game is primarily a third practice scuffle for each team.

El Camino Goes Against SMCC

Metropolitan conference darkhorse, Santa Monica City College gallops into Murdock Stadium Saturday, at 8 p.m. to meet undefeated El Camino College.

The Warriors go into the first conference game on the crest of a three-game winning streak, having obliterated Mt. San Antonio College over the weekend, 34-0 at the Walnut campus.

The Corsairs, meantime, were manhandling once powerful Phoenix College, 30-0, on the Arizona field. Santa Monica holds a 2-1 non-conference record, having topped Mesa College, Colo., 18-0, and lost to Fullerton College, 27-6.

Saturday's game will mark the 18th meeting between EC and the Corsairs since 1947, the Warriors holding a 9-8 margin.

Last season El Camino moved ahead to Samo, 28-21, on a fogged-in field in Santa Monica.

Quarterback Carey Hubert paced EC's first shutout of the season Saturday, as he threw three touchdown passes. He scored once himself on a 1-yard keeper.

All total, the North High grad accounted for 295 yards passing, with 12 for 18 completions and no interceptions. A touchdown pass in the first quarter was called back because of offsetting penalties.

On El Camino's first play of the second quarter, Hubert let fly with a 79-yard bomb to his brother, Dave, who outran his defenders for the score. Bob Jenks boomed the Tribe 22-yard line.

Lawndale to Invade Montgomery on Friday

Bishop Montgomery has an opportunity to get into big time company in the football ranks: Friday night when Lawndale comes to town.

Lawndale polished off Beverly Hills, 20-7, and lost to tough Redondo, 21-13, in two outings. The Cardinals are a contender for the Pioneer League title. Only a 7-6 loss to El Segundo last year marred an unbeaten season for the Cards.

Montgomery breezed past St. Genevieve, 39-6, and Lennox, 39-0, in its first two engagements.

Montgomery got a strong running game from backs Dave Moseley and Gary Nesenson and a combination of keeper runs and passes from Danny Graham to rout Lennox, another Pioneer League member.

The Knights are expected to get a much tougher reaction from Lawndale.

Jim Coleman, the Card quarterback, fired touchdown passes to Jeff Freeman and Phil Hampton for 37 and 25 yard scores. He completed 3 passes for 105 yards.

Rudy Metoyer was the leading ball carrier for Lawndale with 59 yards in 13 carries.

Redondo Battles Cougars

With seven school involved in the Bay League football scramble, six of them launch their championship bid Friday night at 8 p.m.

A game which may decide the Bay League title will be played between Redondo and Hawthorne at the Cougar stadium.

South plays its third straight home game against a darkhorse entry, Santa Monica.

North entertains Inglewood. Both teams are inexperienced at this stage, but expected to be tough before the season gets too old.

Mira Costa, the other league member, draws a conference bye and will meet Dominguez in a third practice tiff.

South has dropped a pair of games to Palos Verdes and El Segundo of the Pioneer League, both by 7-6 scores.

Santa Monica, coached by Dick Turner, formerly of Torrance, went down to defeat in its first two games against potent Long Beach Wilson, 32-0, and San Bernardino Pacific, 21-14.

The Vikings have now lost five straight games since tying Redondo, 14-14, last year.

But Samohi has some strong linemen, including guard Bill Hirsch, and linebackers Larry Thorn and Dale Dehnke.

Quarterbacking the club has been Gene Descaizi, a 155-pound senior. Gene was an end last season.

Coach Ken Swift of South has been toying with the idea of using two of his quarterbacks in the same lineup, thus giving regular quarterback Scott Christensen a shot at the tailback position.

Christensen, possibly the hardest runner on the squad, has been used at quarterback for his passing and rollouts.

Should Swift decide to move Christensen to a running back position, he has Snapper Douglas, a junior, and Jerry Dudley, a senior, to fill the quarterback slot.

Wingback Dale Hewitt of the Spartans injured his foot against El Segundo last Friday, and it was not reported whether he would be ready for Santa Monica.

The South defensive unit has been praised for limiting the opposition to two touchdowns. One of those came from the 10 yard line by El Segundo after a blocked kick.

Jim Kauble, a guard, has been outstanding in the line for South.

NORTH PICKED on two tough opponents for non-league conditioning and got dumped by Warren, 30-19, and Westminster, 14-7.

Going into the Bay League campaign, the Saxons start off against the lesser of the powerhouses—Inglewood.

The Sentinels beat rival Morningside, 2-0, last Friday, after a near upset of Leuzinger the previous weekend. Inglewood was beaten by the Olympics, the favorite in the Sky League, 6-0.

The fact Inglewood has 14 lettersmen, including ends Gene Kerkorian, Ed Hogan, Don Marsh and quarterback Pete Wucetich, is an indication the Sentinels can develop into a topflight squad.

The North Saxons likewise are coming along on a gradual basis. They have running power in Steve Schmitz and Kent Major, and when QB Henry Lopez gets back on his feet, Coach Ed Levy will be able to pair him with Jerry Ball for a strong 1-2 punch at the quarterback post.

HAWTHORNE pounded Pioneer, 19-6, then routed Long Beach Poly, 20-0, for its first two victories. Dave Chauncey, who concentrated on kicking conversions a year ago, has become one of the best quarterbacks in the league. He was credited with leading the victory against Poly.
