Veteran Prosecutor Will Enter Private Practice

T. B. McNary has served 36 years in the District Attorney's office and now he's going to see what it's like to be in private practice. Some time toward the end of this month he will start sharing an office with Walter Anderson at 340 S. Sepulveda Blvd., Manhattan Beach. Anderson is city attorney for Manhattan Beach and Gardena.

McNary, a Torrance resident, has headed the District Attorney's South Bay office for seven years. He tried his hand also, coming up the promotion route, at several other posts in the department.

"I HAVE thought for a long time that I would like private practice," he told District Attorney Evelle J. Younger. "More than once I felt ready to make the move, but it never seemed to be the right time."

"For us," Younger replied, "losing a man of your capacities is always a wrong-time development. But I can't

quarrel with a man making a change. We all wish you the best." Younger himself changed jobs a number of times — from city prosecutor of Pasadena to Municipal Court judge to Superior Court judge and finally, last year, to District Attorney.

McNARY, now 62, said he intends to continue in private practice "for at least 10 years." That would give him 42 years in the legal field. Actually, his service in the District Attorney's office predated his admission to the bar. He joined the department as an investigator December 24, 1928, and it wasn't until 1933 that he became a lawyer.

Earlier he earned his bachelor's degree at Stanford University and was a graduate of the University of Southern California Law School.

HE SERVED in military government during World

War II, attaining the rank of Army major.

McNary lives with his wife Dorothy at 5304 Reese Road. They have three children: Thomas B., a sales manager in Philadelphia; David, an appraiser for American Savings and Loan Association in Redondo Beach; and Susan, a student at Lewis and Clark College, Portland, Ore.

Committee Chairman To Sneak

Faculty members and parents of Torrance High School students will meet Wednesday with the chairman of an accrediting committee due to visit the campus next spring. Dr. Edward V. Ryan, assistant superintendent of Rialto Unified School District, will explain the forthcoming appraisal of the school by the Western Association of School and Colleges in the high school auditorium at 3:15 p.m. Nearly 200 teachers, non-teaching employees, PTA board members, parents, and district administrators are expected to turn out for the meeting.

Accredited by WASC in 1961, Torrance High School is due for its first five-year evaluation in March. A visiting committee of five members will tour the school for three days beginning March 21.

PURPOSE OF the five-year evaluations is to "provide for the insurance of a continuous upgrading of secondary education," according to Dr. Carl Ahee, principal of Torrance High. "Next Spring's visit will provide an in-depth study of each of the subject matter areas of the curriculum to be used as a basis of recommendation of further means of improving the instructional program," Ahee said.

Homeowners Ask Pilots To Obey Flight Pattern

A park, a school, and enforcement of the flight pattern for Torrance Municipal

Airport are the goals of the Southwood-Riviera Homeowners Association.

Don McCauley, president of the homeowners group, listed the three goals during a brief address to members of the West Torrance Lions Club Thursday.

"We are not anti-airport," McCauley declared. "We are anti-pilots who ignore the fact that people live below."

McCAULEY said the homeowners group, has been trying to reach an understanding with airport officials, including the Federal Aviation Agency and Airport Manager Jack Egan, on the flight pattern. The pattern, developed in cooperation with homeowners, has been designed to restrict air traffic over the Southwood-Riviera area to a minimum.

Some question about the approval of the pattern is partly responsible for the misunderstanding, McCauley said. The FAA actually has sanctioned only four flight patterns — at Los Angeles,

Chicago, and New York — in the nation, he said. "We've got one here," McCauley warned.

The homeowners' president said his group has purchased its own registry of aircraft in the nation and does its own spotting. He said violation of the air pattern run about 25 per cent and blamed most of the violations on pilots from other airports.

FIXED-BASE pilots from the airport are responsible for very few violations, he noted.

McCauley blamed the high

Realty Office Raided

More than \$4,000 worth of property was taken from Torrance homes by burglars Friday and several office machines were taken from a North Torrance realty office.

A coin collection valued at \$1,500 was taken from the apartment of Harry L. Aberle at 20810 Anza Ave., police were told. Aberle said the burglars got 11 leather-bound albums of mint United States coins and 14 proof sets.

Police said the burglar apparently used a flat blade to pry the lock on the front door of the apartment. The theft occurred between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. Friday.

PROPERTY valued \$2,000 was reported taken from the home of John Nagel, 158 Via Pasquale, sometime between 5:45 and 11:30 p.m. Friday. The thief ransacked the Nagel home before taking three men's wrist watches, a movie camera, two revolvers, a radio, three credit cards, a wall clock, and \$50 in change.

The burglar apparently entered the home through a bathroom window. A small clock which had been unplugged had stopped at 9:46 p.m.

Theft of seven adding machines and two typewriters from the Bayroc Realty office at 17422 Prairie Ave., was reported by Ken Battram. Battram told police the theft occurred between 6:30 and 11:30 Friday evening.

IN A FOURTH major burglary, two television sets, a camera, and two radios were taken from the home of Herbert C. Swank at 3731 W. 227th St. Swank reported the theft about 5:30 p.m.

A toaster and a small electric clock also were taken.
