WEST HIGH WINS

Bell Gardens Beaten, 42-0

 "Tell the Normans to look out. We're coming after them."

That's the message Fred Peterson wanted delivered to Beverly Hills immediately after Friday night's football game at West High School, where the Warriors smothered Bell Gardens, 42-0, and ran their season record to 3-0.

It was the biggest offensive showing in West High history, and one of the best defensive efforts by the Warriors this year. West piled up 346 yards with its running and passing and limited Bell Gardens to 37 yards - 35 of those on a single play late in the final period.

Junior QB Gary Swanson provided the biggest thrill of the game for fans as he returned a third-period punt 45 yards to set up one touchdown and then tossed a 21-yard pass to end Steve Parton in the fourth quarter for a touchdown.

The pass brought the 3,000 fans to their feet and prompted Peterson to dub the 155-pound understudy as "next year's quarterback."

Otherwise, scoring was well rationed among the Warriors. Only halfback Paul Gadbols scored twice - once in the first quarter on a 1-yard run and again in the third stanza on a 4-yard run.

Quarterback Ron Norman sneaked across the goal line for one touchdown and passed 22 yards to Joel Hons to account for both touchdowns in the second quarter.

Fred Schwanbeck also picked up six points with a 22-yard dive in the final period.

Dave LaRoche added the extra point after each touchdown with six perfect place kicks.

Bell Gardens managed only one sustained drive in the game. It began on their own 35-yard line after West fumbled and penetrated to the West 15 before it was halted by the Warrior line.

Gadbols carried the ball 15 times for 127 yards - more than half of the 252 yards which West gained on the ground. Norman completed 7 of 15 passes for 69 yards and had one intercepted.

Inglewood scored its first touchdown in three games in the second quarter as Neil Baker ran six yards with a handoff. The TD culminated a drive of 51 yards in 11 plays.

Midway through the third quarter North took possession of the ball following a punt return to the Inglewood 24. Two plays later Richard Gonzales galloped 19 yards for the tying touchdown and Joe Franco's boot made it 7-6.

Inglewood drove the length of the field to go ahead at the 3:17 spot on the clock as Mark Windish struggled for four yards to gain a touchdown.

North's Jerry Ball passed for 42 yards and his "reserve" backfield plowed the earth for 89 yards, but Inglewood compiled 48 yards passing and 191 on the ground to control the game.

GRAND PRIX Parnelli Jones To Race Again

Parnelli Jones, who long ago proved his ability to drive race cars, proved his versatility last year by winning his first sports car race.

The 32-year-old Indianapolis 500 winner of 1963 will defend that sports car victory Oct. 30-31, at Riverside International Raceway in the eighth annual Times Grand Prix for sports cars.

Jones' entry in the rich (\$40,000 plus) 200-mile road race was announced by Glenn Davis, race director, who also disclosed the Torrance, Calif. driver is part of a team entered by Texas sportsman John Mecom Jr.

Walt Hansgen of Bedminster, N.J., the long-time road racer (15 years) and two-time Indianapolis 500 competitor, also will carry Mecom colors in the annual charity classic.

They will drive Lola Type 70 sports cars, built in England by Eric Broadley. The engines will be the American 289 Ford powerplants prepared by Shelby American.

It was this kind of power that carried Jones to an impressive triumph over the same 2.6-mile course last year when he drove a Cooper-Ford for Carroll Shelby.

That race was Jones' debut in sports car racing. He grabbed an early lead to pull away to a record triumph by averaging 99.245 m.p.h. before a crowd of 83,330. His purse of \$14,450 was also a record.
