


**Stamp Club to Hold Meeting**

**Coast Guard Academy Sets Cadet Appointment Exams**

Entrance examinations for appointments to the United States Coast Guard Academy will be given throughout the Pacific Southwest area Dec. 4, according to the 11th Coast Guard District.

The competition, centered around a series of College Entrance Examination Board tests, will be held at virtually every high school and college in Southern California, Southern Nevada, and Arizona.

Testing is the sole determining factor in the appointment of cadets for the academy. There currently are no Congressional appointments or geographical quotas for the four-year service academy.

TO QUALIFY, applicants must be high school seniors or graduates who will be at least 17, but not more than 22, on July 1, 1966.

Applicants still in high school must earn a minimum of 15 units and graduate by next June 30.

Physical requirements include a height of from 64 to 78 inches with proportionate weight, and at least 20/30 vision in each eye, correctable to 20/20. All applicants must be in excellent health.

COAST GUARD Academy curriculum, which leads to a bachelor of science degree in engineering and a commission as a Coast Guard ensign, offers courses in the humanities, engineering, and military and applied sciences. Cadets undergo annual training cruises, including a tour of duty on board the 295-foot training barque Eagle.

During their training, cadets are paid \$1,450 each year.

Application forms and further information about the competition are available from the Personnel Procurement Office, 11th Coast Guard District, Heartwell Building, 19 Pine Ave., Long Beach 90802.

**Profits Top \$5 Million In Quarter**

Third quarter earnings of United California Bank were equal to 92 cents per share on an average of 5,761,392 shares, according to a report just released by Frank L. King, chairman of the board.

King said earnings for the third quarter were \$5,326,210. Earnings for the first nine months of the year amount to \$15,136,175, equal to \$2.65 per share and up 16 per cent from last year, he added.

Total deposits on Sept. 30 were \$2,722,244,053 and loans increased to \$1,940,103,179 on Sept. 30. United California Bank is the nation's 14th largest bank with 178 offices in California.

**South Bay Forum Series**

**Panelists to Explore 'Freedom of Dissent'**

"Freedom of Dissent" will be the first topic in the 1965 Fall series of Explorations in Controversy, sponsored by the South Bay Forum, Inc.

The series will begin Wednesday and continue on successive Wednesdays at the Torrance Recreation Center, beginning at 7:55 p.m.

Panelists for the first discussion of the series will include William Cohen, professor of law at the University of California at Los Angeles Law School, and Michael Hannon, a law student and Los Angeles police officer under suspension for activities connected with non-violent demonstrations.

ALSO ON the panel will be Ralph Brogdon, a Southwest area attorney, and the Rev. Speed Leas, pastor of Immanuel United Church of Christ of the Watts area.

Panelists will discuss the legal and moral issues of civil disobedience, according to C. B. Pearlston of South Bay Forum, Inc.

Other topics in the seven-week series include "Freedom of Inquiry," "Freedom of Association," "Freedom of Religion," "Freedom of Conscience," "Freedom of Expression," and "Freedom of Affiliation."

**Fencing Will Be Installed At Victoria**

Twenty and 30-foot-high fencing is being installed around the new Victoria Park Golf Course for the protection of nearby homes and passing cars.

The fences will prevent most stray shots from leaving the course and creating problems for nearby Victoria Park, homes, and vehicles, according to Supervisor Kenneth Hahn.

Construction is proceeding well on the new 18-hole course, which is expected to be opened for play in 1966.

The course and clubhouse are being financed by the County Retirement Board which will lease it to the county upon its completion. Green fees and revenues from the course will pay back the investment.

**City Bank Earnings Show Gain**

An increase of 8 per cent in earnings over 1964 was reported today for City National Bank by Alfred Hart, president of the Beverly Hills based bank.

Hart said earnings amounted to \$1,592,845 for the nine months which ended Sept. 30. All figures have been adjusted to reflect the merger of Guaranty Bank of Torrance and First National Bank of South Gate with City National Bank.

Total resources as of Sept. 30 were \$258,238,000 and loans equaled \$170,200,000, Hart said.

**March of Dimes**

**Postmaster Appointed Chairman**

The appointment of Mrs. Clara Conner, Torrance Postmaster, to the post of Torrance chairman for the 1966 March of Dimes campaign has been announced by retired Los Angeles County Sheriff Eugene W. Biscailuz and District Attorney Evelle J. Younger, co-chairmen for the Los Angeles County Chapter.

The first duties of Mrs. Conner as head of the local 28th annual drive in January will be to supervise the recruitment of men, women and teenagers to serve as volunteers.

The county leaders pointed out that past local March of Dimes campaigns helped bring about the conquering of polio. Both the Salk and Sabin vaccines were solely financed through the March of Dimes.

They outlined the organization's present full-scale concentration on the fight against birth defects.

"HERE IN Los Angeles County alone, at least 10,000 babies are born each year with a significant birth defect, with over 700 deaths annually due to congenital malformations. One baby out of 16 will need special care," state the leaders.

The March of Dimes supports a local Birth Defects Treatment Center for children as well as 52 additional centers located throughout the nation.

"As the population increases, the number of children born with birth defects will increase proportionately. More full-term infants die of birth defects than any other condition, but thousands of children born with birth defects do not die. They live to face serious mental and physical problems for the rest of their lives," added the chairmen.

"The challenge of birth defects has gone through the ages, devastating in its toll, baffling science and the art of medicine, a barren physiological badlands where, few seeds of clinical improvement had taken root."

"FOR THE FIRST time in history, a volunteer health agency has organized a concerted attack on birth defects a problem as old as time. The March of Dimes is the largest single national source of private support for research and patient care in birth defects," they concluded.
