

### New Texts To Be Used In Classes

Five dozen fourth-grade teachers in Torrance stayed after school one day last week.

When the 3:30 bell rang, the teachers dismissed their students, gathered up their papers, and headed for the Educational Materials Building.

Their purpose was to learn about new social studies textbooks. This fall, 12 new texts dealing with Japan, Africa, and California are being used in the fourth grade.

THE IN-SERVICE workshop was conducted by Mrs. Gertrude Aldershof, curriculum consultant, and Lynn Eden, Lynn Shidler, and Neil Lewis, consultants in the educational materials.

Lewis showed the group the new books, while Eden demonstrated the use of filmstrips, films, and records to supplement the new books.

Teachers also were given an opportunity to examine resource kits which contain such things as small carved animals and tribal masks. Bibliographies of supplementary materials were distributed.

WHAT WILL the teachers emphasize in classroom lessons on California, Japan, and Africa this fall?

Children will learn how life in California—and elsewhere—is influenced by physical environment, by the heritage of the past, and by cultural interchange, Mrs. Aldershof said.

"Through learning about people and events that have contributed to the greatness of California and by exploring the important relationship between people and their environment, we expect our students will become aware that people are products of their environment," Mrs. Aldershof said.

### Viet Nam Vets May Get Loans

A new group of California war veterans immediately can begin applying for their Cal-Vet farm or home loans, according to Joseph M. Farber, director of veterans affairs.

Friday September 17, California's cold war veterans' bill became the law of the state, Farber said. "That means we can begin making Cal-Vet loans to qualified veterans of the Viet Nam action and veterans of at least eight peacetime actions in which a medal was authorized by the government of the United States."

The new group of veterans will join three other groups—22,000 veterans of World War I, 156,000 veterans of World War II, and 44,400 veterans of the Korean War—all of whom have availed themselves of the Cal-Vet Farm and Home Loan benefit.

FARBER explained that many of the new group have already confirmed their eligibility and received the certificates of eligibility which are used with their loan applications.

"These veterans must show they were either born in California or entered the qualifying service as residents of California," Farber explained, "then show they have received the medal authorized by the government that will qualify them for this benefit."

### Health Center Automatic Telephones Installed

Earl W. Kendrick, M.D., Torrance District Health Officer, Los Angeles County Health Department, has announced the installation of an automatic answering telephone. This telephone is installed in the Harbor Health Center and covers both the Torrance and Compton health districts.

Dr. Kendrick said anyone wishing health or immunization information should dial 831-1891 for the automatic phone message.

The primary purpose of the new service is to provide timely information to the public regarding immunizations against diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus and polio.

"RECENT STUDIES show that in Los Angeles County a large percentage of children are not adequately protected against the preventable diseases," Dr. Kendrick said. In families with incomes of \$5,000 to \$7,499 per year, 43 per cent of the children under the age of 5 are not adequately immunized against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus, he added.

In families earning under \$4,000, the percentage of inadequately immunized children increases to 64 per cent. Even in families earning \$10,000 and over, 31 per cent of the children under 5 are inadequately immunized.

"Infants should be immunized beginning at one to two months of age. Booster or reinforcing doses of the immunizing toxoid should be continued throughout childhood and school years. Immunizations can be obtained from your private physician or from the nearest Los Angeles County Health Center," Dr. Kendrick explained.

### Appears at Montgomery

Dr. Jester Hairston, folk singer, conductor, and lecturer, appeared at Bishop Montgomery High School last week under the sponsorship of the junior class.

Hairston has toured Africa and Europe on several occasions as a goodwill ambassador for the United States Department of State and was awarded an honorary degree by the University of the Pacific, Stockton, Calif., in 1963.

Among his credits are roles in the motion pictures "The Alamo," and "To Kill a Mockingbird." For 16 years, Hairston played the role of LeRoy on the Amos and Andy television show. He also dubbed the spiritual "Amen" for Sidney Poitier in "Lilies of the Field."

### Traffic Rules Listed To Protect Children

With school now open, Lomita residents are reminded to be extra alert to traffic safety rules. The Lomita Traffic Commission urges drivers to respect all traffic laws and school regulations and to slow down near the schools.

Children walking to school are reminded to:

- Cross only at crosswalks.
- Be sure to look both ways before stepping off curbs.
- Cross only on proper signals.
- Watch for turning cars.
- Never step into the road between parked cars.

Children riding bicycles to school must obey the following rules:

- Ride one ONLY on a bike.
- Walk bikes across intersections.
- Ride only on the right side of the street.
- Obey all signs and signals.

Parents driving to school should remember the following:

- Have children sit back in seats to insure safety in case of sudden stops.
- Keep doors tightly closed and locked and forbid children to play with door handles.
- Set a designated location on the school side of the street for letting out and picking up children.
- Use extra caution when approaching schools.
