

# Confirmation Seaside to Hold Class For Youth

A two-year confirmation instruction course will begin tomorrow at Seaside Community Church, a United Church of Christ, 22902 Ocean Ave.

The 45-session course is designed to focus attention on the dramatic unfolding of the Biblical narrative and to apply the unity-within-diversity to the problems of everyday life.

The first-year class uses the text, "The One Story," by Hulda Niebuhr, a modern English paraphrase of the Scriptures with emphasis on the theme of God's action in history towards reconciliation.

Second year students use "My Confirmation," a text on practical applications of the Biblical teachings, and the Evangelical catechism.

Students entering seventh grade and older are eligible for enrollment. The course is conducted by the Rev. Francis A. Rath, pastor.

# Organist to Present Final ECC Concert

Would a badly sprained hand ruin the career of a concert pianist?

The expected answer would be, "yes," but that just wasn't the case of organist Joyce Jones, who will appear in the final "Concert on the King's Highway" program at El Camino Friday evening.

At the time of a serious injury to her right hand, Miss Jones was entering an advanced phase of music study preparatory to a concert career on the piano. Unable to play, but unwilling to leave the study of music, Miss Jones began practicing on the foot pedals of the organ.

The rest of the story is a history of fame and success. Miss Jones is now one of the world's recognized organ virtuosos.

IN RECENT tours of Europe, as well as America, Miss Jones received outstanding reviews. Europeans were amazed to see a woman perform on the organ so well because, in Europe, the organ is considered a man's instrument.

Miss Jones is the only organist to win the G. B. Dealey award in Dallas. She made her debut with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra in 1959. In 1963, she was a semi-finalist in the Bach International Organ Competition held in Ghent, Belgium.

SHE HOLDS the certificate of Fellow in the American Guild of Organists and is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda and Mu Phi Epsilon, music societies. She is listed in Who's Who of American Women.

Tickets for the 8:30 p.m. concert are on sale in the student store at the Campus Center and will be sold at the box office Friday evening.

# Hahn Asks Federal Loan For Water Reclamation

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn has urged the county's new Water Resources and Reclamation Advisory Commission to become a "motivating force" to obtain federal support in building water reclamation facilities in Southern California.

Hahn suggested it would be wise and economical for the Department of the Interior to loan — not give — the County Sanitation Districts the necessary funds to construct nine reclamation plants.

A detailed engineering and feasibility study has been prepared by John Parkhurst, chief engineer for the Sanitation Districts, which shows these plants could reclaim up to 100 million gallons of water a day for public use.

"THE ONE-TIME use of water is a luxury which no longer can be afforded," Hahn said, "especially since science and technology have given us the knowhow to reclaim and purify water and use it again and again."

Hahn said he deplores the fact that at present the city and county of Los Angeles dump more than 550 million gallons of water a day into the Pacific Ocean from Playa del Rey and San Pedro.

Approximately 10 years ago, Hahn pressed for the construction of the Whittier Narrows Reclamation Plant which is now operating and reclaiming for public use more than 12 million gallons of water a day.

"WE DON'T need any more engineering studies to see if it is practical to reclaim water and sell it," Hahn said. "We have proven that."

"I hope this new commission will give this sound and feasible program highest priority and direct its efforts toward obtaining a federal loan of \$20 million to finance

construction of more water reclamation plants."

Parkhurst's feasibility study shows that water plants could be established in Inglewood, the Dominguez area, Pomona, Azusa, the Walnut Creek area, Arroyo and Eaton areas near Pasadena, and Long Beach.

HE STRESSED a loan from the federal government would "not be a gift or a federal handout." It would be a sound allocation of funds which would be repaid from the sale of reclaimed water to local water districts.

Hahn also challenged the newly formed citizens' commission to "stimulate an interest in more atomic power to convert salt water to fresh water — a plan advocated by the Board of Supervisors since 1952."


# B'nai-Brith Temple Sets Anniversary Celebration
