

Police Holding Cycle Classes

Officers in Class Learn Cycle Skills

When a Torrance Police Officer is assigned to the department's motorcycle squad, he isn't just handed a set of keys and a book of traffic citations and told to go to work.

Until recently, the motorcycle officer was trained at the Los Angeles Police Academy. Now, however, Torrance conducts its own motorcycle training course.

Officers who will be assigned to the motorcycle squad first must undergo nearly 90 hours of training—almost three weeks—in the fundamentals of handling a motorcycle, care and cleaning the machine, and Torrance police policy and procedure.

The intensive training is designed to develop "well rounded traffic officers and safe motorcycle riders." The course is divided into three phases: soft surface motorcycle riding, hard surface riding, and classroom instruction.

The average Torrance Traffic officer will spend between 70 and 80 hours on a motorcycle during the training period. About half the time is devoted to handling the machine on a hard surface such as a street. The remainder of the time is spent learning fundamentals of handling a motorcycle on a soft surface.

The classroom phase of the program is designed to teach officers the care and cleaning of their motorcycles, policies and procedures of the Torrance Police Department, and a study of laws which pertain to motorcycle officers. Sixteen hours are devoted to the classroom phase of the program.

During the actual training, officers are taught the basic functions of a motorcycle, learn to start and stop the vehicle, and practice a variety of precision movements designed to teach them how to control the motorcycle.

Officers also are exposed to the dangers of riding a motorcycle and taught the ways to minimize those dangers.

Only after officers have completed the course to the satisfaction of instructors are they given the keys to a police department motorcycle.

Yearbook, Newspaper Get Awards

Two Redondo Groups Hold Picnic, Game


