Palos Verdes Gets Key Win

"They out hit us." That's how West Coach Fred Peterson summed up Friday night's Pioneer League opener against Palos Verdes. The contest — if it can be called a contest — was won by Palos Verdes, 27-7, as more than 4,000 fans looked on in the West High stadium.

The victory gave the Sea Kings a 5-0 season record and a firm claim on this year's Pioneer League flag. It was West's first loss of the year, leaving the Warriors with a 4-1 record.

"Their line beat our line," Peterson said. "They just lived in our backfield. That's the difference."

West scored first when, with less than a minute to go in the first quarter, defensive tackle Len Muellich intercepted a Palos Verdes pass and ran it back 18 yards. Dave LaRoche kicked for the PAT to send the Warriors into a short-lived 7-0 lead.

It didn't take Palos Verdes long to even up the score. Less than a minute into the second stanza, tailback Bill Tapp scored the first of four Sea King touchdowns and converted to tie the game at 7-7. Tapp went six yards for the TD.

Palos Verdes upped the score to 14-7 near the end of the half when full back Bill Whitmore, substituting for regular Gary Bilotti, carried five yards for a touchdown and Tapp again converted.

The Warriors surrendered two more touchdowns in the fourth quarter. Mark Hereford scored the first one on a pass from Lloyd Miller. The play, good for 11 yards, began as QB Jack Levy pitched out to Miller.

Tapp scored the final touchdown, going two yards to end a drive which had begun on the Warrior 12-yard line. Ron Spencer converted. Tapp, who has averaged better than 100 yards per game in the rushing department, was held to 59 yards by the Warriors. He added 15 more with two pass receptions. His 14 points pushed his season total to 57, good enough to hold his scoring lead in the area.

Peterson cited Palos Verdes' speed as the key factor in the game. "They've got some really fast kids," he said. "Every time (Paul) Gadbois turned the corner, there were two men waiting."

"We popped the whole game," Peterson said of his line. But he noted defensive end Richard Rupert and guard Miles Knudsen were "living with us."

The usually potent West offense never got off the ground. Gadbois, the Warriors' leading ground gainer, was held to 13 yards in 9 carries. West's passing was equally dismal. QB Ron Norman threw 15 times, completing only three for a net gain of 26 yards. One pass was intercepted.

Both teams played without the services of their first unit fullbacks — Bilotti of P.V. and Gary Singleton of West.

But the key absence in the West line-up was linebacker Ron Sells. Sells twisted his ankle last week against Beverly Hills and sat out most of the game.

In a twilight game, West's Bees defeated Palos Verdes, 24-0, to run its season record to 5-0. The Warrior Bees also picked up a win against the Sea Kings in an afternoon game, 19-0.

South Blanked Again

Casualties Mar Win By Sents

There were probably more casualties in the South-Inglewood High football game Friday night than in Viet Nam.

Hospitalized from South were first string guards Jim Kauble and Bob Nicholas.

Nicholas, who received a slight head injury in the Santa Monica game, suffered a broken nose against Inglewood.

Kauble was released from a hospital with a swelling ankle. He was to report yesterday for X-rays.

Three Inglewood players sustained injuries, the most serious of which was a reported broken collarbone for another guard, Tom Mears.

Inglewood, unable to muster much of an offense until it rolled into the South Stadium, went to the airplanes for three touchdowns in the first half and settled for a final 28-0 victory.

South's other two losses were of equal consequence. The Spartans were blanked by Santa Monica, 41-0, and Redondo, 27-0.

If South had any ambitions, for the season, it would have been some sort of revenge against a Ralph Gambin, a defector, who during the wrestling campaign last spring switched from South to Mira Costa.

The departure of Gambin may not have overwhelmed the student body or the coaching staff, but when this type of thing happens, it is pretty well remembered in future combat.

Against Inglewood, however, South treated the Sentinels like their sisters. After all, it wasn't much more than a "Green and White" game when you stop to consider the teams' color schemes.

The first score by Inglewood came with 48 seconds gone in the game. That's how long it took from the kickoff to the first play from scrimmage when Steve Sass pitched a pass to end Gene Kerkorian who galloped 65 yards goalward.

Neil Baker kicked the first of four extra points.

Sass tossed a 12-yard touchdown pass to Mark Windisch later in the first quarter for a 14-0 margin.

In the second quarter it took the Sentinels seven plays to go 52 yards with Sass connecting to Kerkorian for the final nine yards.

Inglewood went 70 yards for a third quarter touchdown. Baker plunged over from the 2-yard line, a few minutes after Kauble was carried from the field.

The action on the field was not fierce enough to warrant injuries, unless it is true more accidents occur during sloppy games.

Coach Ken Swift, anxious to try anything to put South on the scoreboard, gave his three quarterbacks — Scott Christenson, Dale Hewitt and Snapper Douglas — opportunities to run the offense.

The closest South came to scoring was the Inglewood 25 yard line at the turn of the third quarter. Hewitt was in command at the time, but a

CRESPI THE VICTOR Bishop Montgomery Loses First Game

Crespi High of Encino got past a major hurdle in its bid for the Camino Real League football championship Friday night.

The power-laden Celts outclassed Bishop Montgomery by dominating the game with eight returning starting lettermen from a defending co-championship team and has the two best backs in the league — namely Brian Porter and John Smith.

They accounted for both Crespi touchdowns and helped pile up 233 yards rushing for the Celts.

But it wasn't until Crespi recovered a Montgomery fumble midway through the third quarter that the first touchdown came about. It occurred on the Knights 35-yard line and three plays later Porter went 23 yards on a fullback draw play for the touchdown.

At the start of the fourth quarter Crespi went ahead 14-0 on a 70 yard drive. It took seven plays with Smith skirting left end for an 11-yard TD.

Bishop Montgomery drove 65 yards for its touchdown. Dandy Danny Graham threw

five straight completed passes to move the Knights to the Celt 3-yard line. On a third down quarterback run from the 1-foot line Graham tallied.

Crespi's domination of the game showed in its 58 scrimmage plays to 24 for Montgomery. The first downs

were 13-5.

Graham's seven completions for the game netted 70 yards, but the whole offense moved for only 41 on the ground.
