Mrs. Fred Lincoln, Jr. will introduce seventeen carefully selected candidates and their families who have applied for the American's Abroad Program through Torrance, South and West High Schools. Within the next several months three of these candidates will be selected to represent their school, community and the United States in another country. It is the purpose of the American Field Service Americans Abroad program to increase understanding among peoples of the world by giving young Americans opportunities to live and study as members of a foreign family.

Two possible programs are offered. The summer program, which was initiated in 1950, gives the student the opportunity to share the daily lives and experiences of the host family from six to ten weeks.

The School Program, begun in 1957 by returnees of the American Field Service program, offers the same advantages plus the addition of a rewarding academic experience. 1,142 students went abroad to 39 countries on the American's Abroad Programs in 1964-65.
