Harvest Halloween Cake Goes Traveling to Potluck Party

When dessert goes traveling to the potluck party, be certain it's the kind that will do you credit when it arrives. A colorful, flavor-intriguing upside-down cake that fits into the ghost and goblin season is the answer.

This Harvest Halloween cake is quickly prepared, starting with popular honey spice cake mix. Honey, butter, prunes and apricots add just the right flavor and combine well with the mix. When baked, the topping is glazed and the fruit has a chewy texture.

If you want to serve 12,

double the recipe. And instead of inverting the cake on a serving plate, take stiff cardboard, cover with foil and turn the cake out on it. No worry about tracing the cake plate after the party!

HARVEST HALLOWEEN CAKE

- 1/4 cup soft butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup honey
- 1 cup pitted cooked prunes
- 1 cup cooked dried apricots
- 1/4 cup apricot juice
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 tbs. honey
- 2 eggs
- 1 pkg. honey spice cake mix

Cover bottom of 13x9x2-inch pan with blend of soft butter and 1/4 cup honey. Arrange fruit over honey mixture. Add apricot juice, water, 2 tbs. honey, and eggs to cake mix. Beat according to directions on package. Pour batter carefully over fruit. Bake at 350 degrees 45 to 50 minutes or until done. Cool cake 10 minutes, then invert on serving plate. Let stand one

minute before removing pan. Serve topped with honey-sweetened whipped cream.



Only four ingredients are required in this "can't fail" cookie recipe.

- ### CREAMY CRUNCHES
- 1 6-oz. pkg. chocolate bits
 - 1 6-oz. pkg. butterscotch bits
 - 1 cup chow mein noodles
 - 1 cup peanuts

Melt chocolate and butterscotch bits in a 1 1/2-quart bowl over hot water. Stir in noodles and peanuts. Drop with 2 teaspoons onto wax paper. Chill until firm. Makes 2 dozen crunches.

- 1 can beer
- 1 1/2 lbs. aged Cheddar cheese, grated
- 1/4 lb. roquefort, crumbled
- 1 tsp. dry mustard
- 2 tbs. soft butter
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1/4 tsp. tabasco sauce
- 2 tsp. grated onion or chives
- Paprika

Place all ingredients except beer in bowl, let stand at room temperature 20 minutes. Mix slowly, adding beer gradually until smooth and fluffy. Serve with pretzel sticks or twists. Makes 5 cups.

FOR VETERANS' CHILDREN

Increased School Aid Due to Begin Shortly

Children of veterans studying under the Orphans Educational Assistance Act will receive the new educational allowance rates next month under terms of a law signed by President Johnson recently, William J. Driver, administrator of veterans affairs, said today.

At the same time, Driver pointed out that the new law removes a restrictive provision for eligibility under the Orphans Education Assistance program. The provision had previously required that the qualifying death or disability result from the "performance of duty." The new

law strikes out the "performance of duty" provision. Driver said the change in the law reopened eligibility for those children whose applications had been denied because they did not meet this provision. He urged that they or their parents or guardians file another application as they may become eligible under the new law.

HE ESTIMATED that more than 1,000 children throughout the nation may now have become eligible because of this change.

The increase in monthly education assistance allow-

ance rates which go from \$110 to \$130 a month for full-time study will affect between 20,000 and 30,000 students in the current school year. During the last school year, more than 25,000 children were studying under the Orphans Education Assistance program.

Almost 80,000 children have taken advantage of the orphans' study program to date, Driver said.

INCREASED rates for part time study will also go into effect in November. Half-time study rates will go from

\$50 to \$60 a month while three-quarter time study rates will increase from \$80 to \$95 a month.

Rates for restorative training for eligible children who have to correct mental or physical disabilities before they can begin regular courses of study will also be increased, Driver said.

While those who were previously denied eligibility must file new claims, no filing is necessary to obtain the increased allowance rates. These payments are automatic and require no correspondence with the VA.
