

'Freedom of Conscience' Topic for Panel Debate

"Freedom of Conscience" will be the topic of a panel discussion Wednesday at the Torrance Recreation Center. The program will begin at 7:55 p.m.

The discussion is the fifth in the fall series of Explorations into Controversy, a program sponsored by South Bay Forum, Inc.

Panelists will include J. B. Tietz, an attorney specializing in conscientious objector cases; J. Brian Schulman, assistant United States attorney; the Rev. H. T. Woodward and David Cheal of the American Friends Service Committee.

The discussion will include a survey of factors involved in conscientious objection decisions.

Fallen Man Is Subject

Scriptural readings on Adam and Eve and Cain and Abel are examined in Christian Science church services today. The subject is "Adam and Fallen Man."

The Golden Text is from Ecclesiastes: "Lo, this only have I found, that God hath made man upright; but they have sought out many inventions."

A theme of redemption is brought out in some passages to be read from the Christian Science textbook: "The divine nature was best expressed in Christ Jesus, who threw upon mortals the truer reflection of God and lifted their lives higher than their poor thought-models would allow, — thoughts which presented man as fallen, sick, sinning and dying."

Gardena Men Open New Plymouth Agency, Plan New Car Facilities

Plans for permanent showrooms and service facilities for Gardena's first Plymouth dealership are now being completed, according to Pete DeLuca and Dean Corbett, owners of the new dealership.

DeLuca-Corbett Plymouth will be located on Western Avenue just north of Redondo Beach Boulevard. In the meantime, the two men have established temporary

facilities at 1900 W. Redondo Beach Blvd. The two men had their Western Avenue location approved by the Chrysler Corp. just three days before the 1966 models were unveiled and spent the three days locating a temporary lot.

DeLuca and Corbett are now operating from an air-conditioned trailer office, selling new automobiles from a gravel lot, and running a new service department. Plans for the permanent facilities are now being drawn and examined by the Chrysler Corp. executives.

DeLuca, a Mason, serves on the boards of directors of the Gardena Valley Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis Club, and YMCA. He was general manager at Tom Roady Dodge before starting the new car sales agency.

Corbett, owner of a used car lot on Hawthorne Avenue, has lived in the area for

36 years. He is a charter member of Elks Lodge 1919 and a member of the Gardena Valley Kiwanis Club.

Fred Berghaus, an experienced Chrysler mechanic, heads the DeLuca-Corbett service department.

National Highway System To Be Completed in 1973

The great Interstate Highway Program, with its now familiar road marker—the red-white-and-blue shield—is moving steadily toward completion in 1973, but along the way this national highway program has created a big new problem for transportation planners.

As getting from city to city by car has become easier, it has become increasingly difficult for the drivers of America's 75 million cars and 15 million trucks and buses to get out of town and onto the highways, through traffic congestion in the suburban sprawl around most American cities.

Highway experts foresee as early as 1971 a growing demand for secondary roads, new city streets, county roads, special roads linking suburban areas and beltways to carry traffic around populated areas. Typical of the latter are today's Route 128 at Boston and the Circumferential Highway now carrying traffic around Washington, D.C.

This predicted secondary road construction program also will help construction firms and workers who might otherwise find their incomes sharply reduced as the Interstate Program reaches its closing days.

EXECUTIVE ROADSHOW—The executive suite can often isolate top management from the realities of the marketplace. Often the problems of the retailers never reach manufacturing executives, who are best able to advise and counsel. But in at least one top U.S. company, this ivory tower isolation has been overcome by a program of executive travel, first begun in 1963.

Two dozen of the top officials of the Bulova Watch Co., including president Harry B. Henshel and others in manufacturing and administrative posts, spend three weeks of the year on the road, visiting retail jewelers in cities across the country. Since 1963 these executives

have logged 300,000 miles in trips to 75 major cities and 200 smaller communities.

The 1965 program has been expanded to place greater emphasis on trips to smaller communities. "There's nothing that tops face-to-face communication when it comes to understanding and appreciating the problems of the retailer," according to Michael D. Roman. "We want to do a better job in our end of the business, so that jewelers can do a better job in theirs. We think this travel program, which is year-round, is the most direct way to accomplish these objectives."

A ready-tied Ascot is now available of washable material in a wide range of colors . . . For boat owners a saltwater testing kit to determine presence of salt water in oil, water storage tanks or water produced by evaporation.

PUSH-OR POUR—Success of pushbutton waxes that millions of women use while dusting has convinced manufacturers that homemakers generally appreciate

the speed and convenience of spray-and-wipe products.

However, there always has been a sizable percentage of women who have preferred liquid polishes to sprays. But liquids usually require two cloths to do the jobs of spreading and wiping, plus more time.

One leader in the field, Johnson Wax, set out to combine the advantages of spray-type dusting waxes with those of liquids. Its answer, now being introduced nationally, is "Instant Pride," a lotion-like liquid with entirely new formulation and packaging. It is squeezed onto a surface and wiped to a shine immediately with one cloth. Dust and smudges are removed in the process, the maker says.

"An overwhelmingly positive response" to tests with 2,100 housewives indicated that the firm's first single-step liquid polish is due to brighten a lot of furniture . . . and prove again, even on a question of pushing or pouring, that consumers' wishes and needs still determine much of what goes into the marketplace.


