The speaker, with her two children, Kathryn Gale and Samuel Patrick, were evacuated from Viet Nam early this year at the beginning of the bombing raids in Viet Nam. The family was flown to Saigon, then to Hong Kong and from there to Torrance to the home of Mrs. Thomsen's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lon Wolf.

Mr. Thomsen, a foreign service officer with the State Department, was injured in the bombing of the embassy. He was also flown home and remained here until July when he returned to his assignment at Danang. Mrs. Thomsen and the children live here at 2741 Andreo.

Mrs. Thomsen, a graduate of Narbonne High and UC at Santa Barbara lived in Saigon for 18 months. She was living at Hue at the time of the evacuation.

The speaker's talk will not only be based on her experiences in Viet Nam but on information learned when she spent the summer of 1961 in India, on Project India, as a junior in college.
