Four Homes in Gala Holiday Attire

Four of the Palos Verdes Peninsula's loveliest homes will be decorated for Christmas and on display when the Women's Fellowship of Neighborhood Church presents its ninth annual Yule Parlor Parade, Friday, Dec. 3, and Saturday, Dec. 4, from noon until 5 p.m.

In addition, tea will be served at Neighborhood Church and the Yule shops will be open, featuring baked goods, Christmas decorations, gifts, aprons, candles and "gold" elephants.

Several Torrance residents, who are members of the Fellowship's Greenwood Circle, are busily engaged making miniature toy drums to be sold for tree decorations and colorful step stools. Mrs. Alfred Miller, Jr., circle chairman, who lives at 326 Calle de Arboles, is directing the project. Other Torrance residents helping with the Yule Parlor Parade are Mrs. Adelaide McKim and Mrs. Leonore B. Glaser, both of 469 Via de Encanto, and Mrs. Samuel Shirley of 202 Calle de Arboles. Mrs. Harold K. Carter of 2950 Carson St. is recording secretary for the Fellowship.

"Christmas Eve Buffet" is the theme of the first stop on the tour. The home of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Stevens, Jr., 3 Quailridge Rd., Rolling Hills, commands a spectacular view from Santa Monica to Wilmington. It is a warm family type home with many lovely old pieces of furniture. A wine cellar graces the dining room. The house has been decorated by E. M. Salmon, A.I.D., of Kasden's La Tienda. Floral displays will be by Chadwick Gardens.

Another sweeping view with Catalina as the prominent feature is part of the charm of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Owen Goodman, 14 Crest Rd., Rolling Hills. Planned for a family of three, "Blackacre" has recently been redone for a family of two. Gary Edwards, interior designer of

Palos Verdes Furnishings, assisted Mrs. Goodman in furnishing and accessorizing the home to accent the owner's heirlooms of Victorian furniture, cut glass and pewter. "Christmas Breakfast" will be on the table.

"Wassail Bowl" at the Sheldon Spelmans, 2301 Via Acalones, Palos Verdes Estates, is the next stop on the tour. This is a contemporary home. Its focal point is a circular stairway at the entry, which winds down to an immensely livable playroom with a large bar. Outlining the stairwell and dividing it from the dining room are wrought iron decorative panels. This home also has a spectacular view of the Santa Monica Bay coastline and the Los Angeles basin. Flowers will be by "Marvin."

Last home will be featured as the setting for "Christmas Dinner." This is the "idea" home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Sears, 4036 Via Nivel, Palos Verdes Estates. Decorated by Mr. and Mrs. Sears, who are both artists, the home is a treasure chest of antiques and copies of antiques. It features a dramatic use of color including shocking pink accents in the dining room and dazzling yellow Austrian drapes in the breakfast area. Mr. Sears, who is an A.I.D. affiliate, has his own business, Charles D. Sears, Interiors, at 2373 Pacific Coast Highway, Lomita.

Neighborhood Church, 415 Paseo Del Mar, is an elegant example of an Italian renaissance villa. It was built as a private home in the 1920's by J. J. Hagarty, department store owner. Handsome hand-decorated ceilings in the sanctuary, lovely gardens and the ocean crashing against the cliff below serve as a dramatic background for the shops and tea.

Mmes. Donald E. Hannum and Harvey Waldo are general chairmen for this year's parade.
