

**Citizenship Test Given New Time**

"The National Citizenship Test," scheduled for broadcast last Tuesday by the CBS Television network, will be aired Tuesday, Nov. 23, at 10 p.m. over KNXT, Channey 2.

The original broadcast was cancelled when electric power was disrupted in New York and other parts of the northeastern United States.

The audience-participation program is designed to give citizens an opportunity to test their knowledge of rights and duties of American citizenship. Forms for use in scoring the test were printed in Press-Herald editions Sunday, Nov. 7.
