

# Dan Graham 'Player of Year'

The traditional post-season all-league football teams will be rushed in from all corners starting nearly next week.

To avoid the flood, the Press-Herald today announces its Torrance All-City Team.

Players are selected from North High and South High of the Bay League, Bishop Montgomery of the Camino Real League, West High of the Pioneer League, and Torrance High of the Sky League.

Selection of the top 12 all-around players was based on offensive and defensive accomplishments during the year, along with their collegiate potentialities in the future.

The "Player of the Year" is Danny Graham, the junior quarterback who is establishing all kinds of offensive records for the future at Bishop Montgomery.

In eight games Graham has completed 62 passes in 102 attempts for a 61 percentage record. He has a passing yardage of 1004 yards for a 15-yard average.

Danny has thrown 12 touchdown passes and has run for six himself.

In 102 pass attempts, the young junior has had two intercepted and runback a total of five yards.

Two senior ends, Mike Leamy and Tom Hanson, made the All-City team from Montgomery High. They were partners in Graham's aerial mastery. This year Leamy caught eight passes for 104 yards and three touchdowns. Hanson was on the receiving end of 12 passes for 262 yards and three touchdowns.

Coach George Swade, who brought a relatively young team to the forefront in prep football circles this year,

has been named "coach of the year." His team goes into its final game with a 7-1 record and a 14-6 win over Fermin Lasuen.

West High also placed three men on the first unit. The outstanding running back on the All-Torrance squad is Paul Gadbois, who, in his only year of varsity football, has totaled 630 yards in 115 carries for eight games for a 5.5 average.

Paul has also completed 4 of 7 running passes for 33 yards. He has caught seven passes for 78 yards. Also the team punter, Gadbois' average is 36.7.

West High went through the season with victories in six of its first eight games and two of the men who made a big difference up front were Tackle Len Muellich and Guard Allan Coward. Muellich, a senior, is an ideal

college prospect and Coward, a junior, will be back at West next year.

Another senior who has seen multiple duty for two years is Torrance High's Terry Tiedeman. Besides averaging 80 yards a game running in a Tartar lackluster season, Tiedeman excels on defense. He was called upon in the second half of both the Beverly Hills and Rolling Hills games for man-to-man pass defense assignments and did the job.

Mike Troup, who has been aboard for every Torrance game and specializes in tackle eligible plays, is a second All-City Tartar.

North High came up with an inexperienced team this year, but Back Steve Schmitz ran like an old pro. Coach Ed Levy referred to Schmitz as one of the hardest running fullbacks in the school's history.

A member of the North line who will be counted upon for a big effort next year is tackle Steve Sharp. When key players were missing from the line-up early in the season, Sharp led the Saxon defense and offense into battle.

An outstanding junior backfield man who is expected to get the raves around local prepdom next year is Jeff Arrieta of South High. Arrieta ran for three touchdowns in a year of scarce scoring at South. He was particularly outstanding as a defensive halfback.

The veteran center for South, Jay Stuart, was named All-City. He was a co-captain for the Spartans and the most consistent all-around player on the team.

As an added attraction the All-City Team has Sharon Coffee for good spirit. A flag twirler by rank, Sharon stands out for passing out encouragement at football games.

## Michigan State Eyes Notre Dame

The football eyes of the nation will be focused on South Bend Saturday when Michigan State tests Notre Dame in a game that could mean the national championship to the winner.

Michigan State owned an 8-0 record going into yesterday's game with Indiana and the Irish were 6-0-1 before meeting North Carolina. Saturday's contest will be the season finale for the Spartans, while the Irish will have Miami (Fla.) remaining.

It will be a battle of two great running teams with equally tough defensive units. The Spartans also can offer the passing combination of Steve Juday and Gene Washington. Bill Zloch, the Irish quarterback, is a proven passer.

Coach Asa Parseghian has

three steady ground-gainers in halfbacks Nick Eddy and Boll Wolski and fullback Larry Conjar. They will challenge a Michigan State defense that has allowed only 50.4 yards per game rushing and held Michigan, Ohio State and Iowa to a combined total of minus 79 yards on the ground.

The Spartan running attack is paced by halfback Clinton Jones and fullback Bob Apisa. Each had scored nine touchdowns prior to yesterday's action. Jones had netted 638 yards and Apisa 614, and each averaged better than five yards per carry.

An added incentive for the Spartans will be revenge for the 34-7 scathing they were handed by the Irish last fall.

Notre Dame is one of State's oldest rivals, the series dating back to 1897. There have been 30 games, with the Irish winning 17 to State's 13. The Spartans have fared better in recent years, however, winning 11 of the last 13 encounters.

There is a chance, however, that the Notre Dame vs. Michigan State game, to be played Saturday for the national championship, will be televised to theaters in Southern California.



Game times for the tiny division are 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. every Saturday morning. The midget games are played Wednesday nights beginning at 6:30 p.m.





# Last Games Near for High School Football

Should the rain let up sufficiently to allow the marking of the stripe lines on the playing fields a regular schedule of high school football games will be played Friday night.

None of the schools in the Torrance School District are in contention for championships however.

Bishop Montgomery still has a chance to finish in a three-way tie for the Camino Real League title. The Knights meet a strong St. Bernard's

eleven at the Playa Del Rey campus while Fermin Lasuen tangles with Crespi.

It will take a Montgomery (3-1) win over St. Bernard's (2-2) and a Lasuen (3-1) win over Crespi (4-0) to create the three-way deadlock.

**IN THE BAY LEAGUE**  
North (2-3) closes out its season at Redondo (4-1).

Redondo's only loss was to Santa Monica, the unbeaten league leader, 22-0.

Santa Monica (5-0) takes on Hawthorne (3-2) for the

chance to sew up the crown. It would be the first championship in the 9-year coaching career for Dick Turner, former Torrance High coach.

Hawthorne, however, has a reputation for spoiling Santa Monica achievements.

South (0-6), which already assured itself last place in the Bay League, goes outside

Leuzinger (3-1) is host to Rolling Hills (2-2) and Culver City (3-1) plays at Beverly Hills (1-3) in a rivalry.

Torrance's chances of winning were improved against Rolling Hills when nine injured and suspended players were restored to the squad.

Jim Kline and Doug Kelsey, two first string absentees against the Titans, may be able to suit up for the homecoming game against Morningside.

West (2-2) closes out its season at home against Lennox (0-4). Coach Fred Peterson of West said, "The rain is an equalizer for any game."

Rounding out the Pioneer League El Segundo (3-2) goes to Aviation (1-3) for the finale.
