

Bishop Blanks Vikings

Press-Herald Sports Editor Bishop Montgomery's most successful varsity football season includes a 25-0 win over St. Bernard's. The win took place Friday night at Playa Del Rey. The Knights, with an 8-1 overall record and a 4-1 league standing, finished in second place in the Camino Real League.

Montgomery lost its only game to league champion Crespi which smashed Fernin Lasuen, 33-13, in a finale Friday night. Crespi (9-0) beat Montgomery, 14-7, to open the season.

Against St. Bernard's, Montgomery exploded on the opening kickoff with Gary Nesenson running it back 92 yards. A booming block by Daryl Mickelbury sprung Gary at the 40 yard line. It was the longest runback of a punt or kickoff in school history.

The second Montgomery touchdown was set up by a fumble of a Knight punt. Mike Leamy recovered at the Vikings' 45. Quarterback Danny Graham pitched a pass to Tom Hanson for 39 yards. From the 5-yard line Graham went four yards on a rollout and handed off to Dave Moseley for the touchdown plunge.

Montgomery drove 76 yards for its third TD as Graham ran for 20 yards and threw to 36 yards to Chuck Bongard. Graham went eight for the score. Irl Davis booted his only extra point.

To start the second half Dan Gillespie, who played the best game for Montgomery, fell on a fumble. The Knights went 31 yards in six plays with Graham tossing in the flat to Bongard for a 7-yard touchdown. It was Graham's 13th touchdown pass of the year.

Montgomery coasted the remainder of the game, threatening only a 37-yard touchdown pass to Bongard that was nullified.

Tom Roach, Mike McClain, Bill Kristufek, Mike Wood, Tom Hanson, and Leamy wrecked the Viking offense throughout the evening.

Graham's passing for the night includes 6 completions in 19 attempts for 88 yards.

West Ends Season With 41-6 Victory

West High ended its 1965 football season with a 41-6 Pioneer League win over Lennox Friday night before a "Grid Night" crowd of 3,000 at West Stadium.

The victory gave the Warriors a 3-2 league record and a third-place tie with El Segundo. West won 7 and lost 2 on the season.

West scored six times, including three in the final quarter.

Biggest play of the game was a 58-yard touchdown pass from Grid King — Ron

Norman to Jim Barnes with 4:12 left in the game. It was Barnes' second touchdown. He scored in the third quarter on a 7-yard run.

Halfback Paul Gadbais also scored twice, climaxing a 67-yard drive with a three-yard run in the first period and galloping 10-yards for a touchdown after Jack Golden blocked a punt in the fourth quarter.

Ron Sells, a linebacker converted to fullback for Friday's game, scored on an eight-yard run in the second quarter. Dave LaRoche scored the final touchdown on a 14-yard pass with 33 seconds left in the game.

The pass was thrown by Gary Swanson, a junior who replaced Norman in the final minute of play. LaRoche kicked five extra points.

Junior QB Gary Sumrak passed 10-yards to Dale Stafford for the Lennox score. West gained a total of 319 yards, including 159 in the air. Norman completed 7 of 12 passes for 145 yards. Barnes had his biggest night of the year, catching

By going undefeated in six league games, Coach Dick Turner, formerly of Torrance High, won his first championship. His Vikings had to whip Hawthorne, 6-2, to gain sole ownership of the title.

Redondo moved on the ground for its five touchdowns against North. The featured run was a 56-yard punt return by Terry Smith.

Doug Ramsey, a junior, scored his first TD on a 10-yard run in the first period. Smith's punt return followed to give the Seahawks a 13-0 lead.

The score went to 19-0 in the second period on a 3-yard run by Al Pill. Luke Lee tallied from the 2-yard line in the third quarter and Rick Norris plunged one yard for a fourth quarter score.

South High, playing a non-league game against Pacific League runner-up Arcadia, was beaten, 26-6, in a non-league game.

Steve Scarborough tallied three touchdowns for Arcadia. Dale Hewitt scored his first TD of the year for winless South.

For the Spartans it was their 17th consecutive defeat. John McCowan scored Santa Monica's lone touchdown and was tackled in the end zone for Hawthorne's safety.
