Sixteen teams are entered in the fall classic. Redondo, the two-time defending champion, started a 28-game win streak by sweeping the tournament last year.



West, South Aim for CIF Country Run

Both South and West High Schools have moved a step closer to possible CIF cross-country championships, but both teams will be cast in the role of underdogs in the CIF finals next Thursday.

Coach Dick Scully's Spartan distancemen won their CIF preliminary at Centinela Park last Tuesday by taking three of the top five spots and finishing with a team score of 33 points.

Simi Valley and Santa Barbara also qualified for the "AAA" division finals with South. Simi was second with

59, while Santa Barbara got third place with 89.

West High's highest finisher was Tom Purkey, whose 10:45 time earned him eighth place. But Coach Bob Holte's Warriors took advantage of the spread-out finish and won the "A" division prelim with 74 points. Mayfair was second and Palos Verdes was third.

CIF finals will be held Thursday at Long Beach State College. The small school division begins at 3 p.m., followed by the "A" race at 3:15. South and the Triple-A entrants will run at 3:45.

Aviation's Jim Dillon, the individual champion in the Pioneer League, qualified for the CIF individual championship race. Dillon's finish in Thursday's finals will not, however, affect the team standings.

Morningside and Redondo qualified for the Double-A finals. Redondo, Bay League champion, finished second in the Bay League meet to South.

Triple-A schools in the CIF finals will include Westminster, rated the favorite by most coaches, Millican (Long Beach), Villa Parks, El Rancho, Ramona, La Habra, Simi Valley, Santa Barbara, and South.

West, now pegged for a fourth-place finish, will compete with teams from Chino, South Hills, Fullerton, Tustin, Mayfair, Charter Oak, La Mirada, and Palos Verdes.

Holte rates Chino as the team to beat. His Warriors were defeated by Chino in the Mount San Antonio Invitational.

Tomorrow is an official practice day on the Long Beach course and teams may run the course during the afternoon.

Sea Kings Advance in Playoffs

Palos Verdes High "tapped" Santa Paula, 20-0, to win a first round football game in the CIF "AA" playoffs at Redondo Friday night.

Eisenhower advanced to the semi-final round in the Double-A playoffs. The team used first downs to break a 7-7 tie. Lawndale vs. Thousand Oaks and Riverside Poly vs. Foothill were scheduled yesterday.

Bill Tapp, without a question one of the best running backs in the CIF, exploded for a 47-yard touchdown gallop in the first quarter for the Sea Kings and ran six yards in the second period for another.

Palos Verdes put the score out of range of Santa Paula in the third period when Lloyd Miller ran back a punt 50 yards for a TD.

Santa Paula's strong passing attack was checked time-after-time by the Sea Kings defenders. Miller and Gary Bilotti each picked off an interception.

Tapp's long TD run was around right end at the 6-minute mark in the first quarter. He set up his second score with a pass to Mark Hereford for 20 yards to the 5-yard line.

Palos Verdes used a series of pickets for Miller on punt returns. He missed running back one 70 yards when he cut inside instead of outside at his own 45-yard line early in the third period. On the next try he cut inside again and went the distance — 50 yards.

In the Triple-A playoffs Temple City downed Culver City, 31-12; Antelope Valley tripped Leuzinger, 19-12; Loara triumphed over Glenn, 33-40; and San Luis Obispo bowed to Crespi, 39-19.

In "AAAA" playoffs Loyola fell to Westminster, 20-6; Pasadena edged St. Francis, 14-13; Oxnard clobbered Santa Monica, 25-7; Long Beach Wilson rolled over Bishop Amat, 26-13; and El Rancho edged Monrovia, 12-7.

Here's a brief rundown on the comedy of errors the Hawks went through in the first period alone.


... five fumbles, losing three.

Munson Out for Season

Hit hard by the loss of quarterback Bill Munson for the rest of the season, the Rams return to the Coliseum this Sunday afternoon for their second game with Green Bay. The Packers took the first round two weeks ago in a defensive battle decided by field goals, 6-3. They beat the Baltimore Colts, 38-13, Sunday to hold second place in the Western Division.

Munson suffered torn ligaments and cartilages in his right knee in the second quarter of the game at San Francisco Sunday, where the Rams received their eighth straight loss, 30-27, to run their season mark to 1-9.

Munson appeared to be on the way to one of his best afternoons before being cut down, racking up nine completions in 15 throws to run his total for the year to 144 for 1,701 yards and 10 touchdowns. Roman Gabriel will be at the controls for the rest of the season.

With six catches, Tom McDonald upped his receiving total to 46 for 635 yards and five touchdowns. Dick Bass, nursing an injured leg, was able to play only a short time, but still tied the 49ers' Ken Willard for top yardage of the day.

Rookie Dan McIlhany pulled even with injured Aaron Martin with two interceptions, as a result of his pick-off of a John Bronie throw Sunday. New punter Jon Kilgore had a respectable average of 40.6 yards on five boots.

North High School's B-football team did a successful job preparing youngsters for future varsity combat and also tied Santa Monica for first place in the win-and-loss column. Both teams were 5-1.

North ended its season with a 12-6 win over Redondo. Other team victories were 35-0 over Inglewood, 7-0 over South, 20-6 over Mira Costa, and 20-13 over Hawthorne. The Saxons only loss was to Santa Monica, 33-0.

A pair of practice round wins were 9-6 over Warren and 13-0 over Westminster. Fullerton, Henderson Accepted for Dec. 11

Fullerton, Calif., and Henderson, Texas, were named to the 20th version of the Junior Rose Bowl Game in Pasadena's famed Arroyo Seco Saucer Saturday, Dec. 11.

The 11-man board of management of six members of the state athletic association and five members of the Pasadena Junior Chamber of Commerce deliberated for several hours before casting deciding ballots.

Making the decision difficult for the selection committee was the result of Saturday night's local grid action that found both Fullerton and Cerritos winning their games to complete unbeaten sea-

sons. Fullerton downed rugged Santa Ana, 28-13, and Cerritos dumped strong Long Beach, 21-15.

Fullerton, coached by Hal Sherbeck, has won 17 games in a row, including a 24-13 win over Bakersfield in last year's Potato Bowl Game. The high-flying Hornets tallied 359 points in 1965 while allowing the opposition 46.

Dodgers Reveal 1966 Home Slate

Skipper Walt Alston's world champion Los Angeles Dodgers open the 1966 season—and the defense of their National League title—at home.

Opening Night on next year's schedule will be Tuesday, April 12, between the Dodgers and the Houston Astros.

Actually, Los Angeles fans will get a preview of the Dodgers in action during the April 9-10 weekend when they conclude their opening training maneuvers in a pair of exhibitions with the Cleveland Indians. Complete details on their Spring games will be announced at a later date.

Once again in 1966 the Dodgers will have seventy-eight playing dates at Dodger Stadium. This includes three Sunday doubleheaders to round out the official 81-game home schedule.

Fifty-nine night games, two holiday day games (July 4 with the Reds and Labor Day with the Giants), five Saturday afternoons and 12 Sundays make up the 78-date program, at Dodger Stadium.

There will be eight home stands for the world champions in 1966. The Astros and Cubs will visit during the six-game getaway gallop. The third home stand gets off to a brisk start with the first series with the San Francisco Giants — night games May 17-18-19.

The longest stay will be

the final stretch when the Giants, Astros, Mets, Pirates and Phillies wrap it up at Dodger Stadium. This begins with a 4 p.m. game on Labor Day against the Giants, followed by two night games. The other San Francisco series is to be played on a Weekend — June 17 (night), June 18 (night), June 19 (day).
