

## Hawthorne Dedication Scheduled

Torrance and Rolling Hills Estates officials will join Supervisor Chairman Burton W. Chace Friday, Dec. 10, in ceremonies to dedicate the newly completed \$2 million improvement of Hawthorne Boulevard.

Ribbon-cutting ceremonies are scheduled at 11 a.m. at the Torrance-Rolling Hills Estates boundary line, Chace said.

Among those expected to participate are Mayor Albert Ison of Torrance, Mayor John Hopkins of Rolling Hills Estates, and city councilmen from both municipalities.

**TORRANCE** Councilman J. A. Beasley, a member of the Inter-Cities Highway Commission, will act as master of ceremonies.

Final completion of the \$2 million overall project opens a vital north-south link providing direct access to the rapidly expanding Palos Verdes Peninsula area, Chace said.

The final link, Chace said, was the \$640,856 contract recently completed by Strecker Construction Co. The entire seven-mile improvement is within the two cities, which contributed nearly \$200,000 to the overall program.

Improvements of the final 1.1-mile link to be dedicated were completed six months ahead of schedule, providing a fully curbed, divided, and channelized highway with four traffic lanes and two parking lanes, Supervisor Chace reported.

IN ADDITION, the overall work included curbs, gutters, pavement, an extensive roadway drainage system and installation of a traffic control system with highway safety lighting at the Palos Verdes Drive North intersection.

The project required moving of nearly 500,000 cubic yards of earth and nearly 500,000 square feet of new paving.

"This type of project cooperation between the county and its cities makes possible development of major highway arterials across jurisdictional lines," Supervisor Chace said.

## Los Angeles Schools Plan Open Attendance Programs

Fifty-five Los Angeles elementary schools will have limited space for out-of-neighborhood transfers next spring, associate superintendent Robert J. Purdy announced today.

Applications for the 2,370 permits at the schools will be accepted beginning Monday, Dec. 6, Dr. Purdy said, and will be taken until Monday, Jan. 31.

Transfer of students from their "home" elementary school to one outside the immediate neighborhood can be accomplished by securing a permit to a school where space is available, Dr. Purdy said.

Permits will be granted on a "first come, first served" basis beginning at 8 a.m. Dec. 6. Transfers will be effective beginning with the start of the spring semester Tuesday, Feb. 1.

Permits are available in the Harbor area at Normont Elementary School, 1001 W.

253rd St., Harbor City, and at Amestoy Elementary School, 1048 W. 149th St., Gardena. Normont will grant 60 permits, while Amestoy has 30 permits available.

Application forms requesting permits must be secured from the principal of the "home" school—the school where the student now attends. After the form is completed, the permit request is taken to the principal of the new school the parent wants the pupil to attend.

The permit then will be granted at the "receiving" school, if space is still available.

But now, to hear our teenagers talk, we are a source of continuing embarrassment to them, upon whom the eyes of the world are perpetually rested. For instance, I am guilty of such "peculiar" behavior as asking others of their age whom I might meet on the outside "if they happen to know any of my children who attend the same school."

"Oh, no, Mother, how could

you! He's in my biology class," one of them will wail.

Or, "Now she'll think that I talk about her at home," from a grumbling son.

It's like playing Russian Roulette trying to guess what will or will not humiliate them. For instance, last week when one of them became ill at school, I sent a taxi to pick her up, rather than ask a neighbor. I figured this display of opulence would have her in seventh heaven. But again I was wrong. "I was never so embarrassed in my life," Elaine sobbed. "Now everybody thinks you don't have any friends." Just call me "Lonesome Addy."

I doubt that the combined efforts of Emily Post and Amy Vanderbilt would help any parent know how to act in front of their children's friends, particularly those of

the opposite sex who call at the house. In fact, just call us "Ma and Pa Kettle" because our kids feel they must brief us first for fear we might commit some unforgivable social blunder.

For instance, I might make the mistake of leading off with, "I've certainly heard a lot about you." (Which would certainly be the truth.) But our teenagers would prefer that I treat all boys as if they had just landed by rocket from Mars. Even if I knew them when their mothers enrolled them in kindergarten.

Our only solution, it would appear, would be for me to enter the room and hand out cards announcing: "I do not speak English." Or perhaps my husband would grunt, "Me Father, Her Mother... You Boy?" That should cure 'em.
