

Potato Bowl Next For Metro Champ

Cerritos College has capped off a perfect 9-0-0 football season by accepting a bid to play in the annual Shrine Potato Bowl game Saturday in Bakersfield.

College officials accepted the bid after Cerritos knocked off defending national champion Long Beach City College, 21-15, for the Metropolitan Conference championship.

It was Cerritos' first Metro grid title in the college's four years.

The Falcons, coached by the Metro's No. 1 spot by Smokey Cates in his second year at the helm at Cerritos, were one of two contenders for a bid to the Junior Rose

Bowl, but the JRB selection committee Sunday morning named Eastern Conference champion, Fullerton (9-0-0) as the game's western representative. Fullerton will face Henderson County, Texas, J.C.

Cerritos' foe in the Potato Bowl will be McCook, Neb., Junior College.

The Cerritos coaching staff and team were wearing big smiles Sunday morning. They had good reasons: Besides Cerritos' first Metro grid title, it was the first time in history a Cerritos College football team has gone undefeated through regular season play.

Saturday night's victory was Cerritos' first over LBCC since the Falcons won the first meeting in a seven-game series 6-0 in 1959.

Cerritos' appearance in the Potato Bowl (which ranks second only to the Junior Rose Bowl as the top junior college post-season game in the nation) will be the Falcons' second. Cerritos, as champion of the Western States Conference in 1960, appeared in the Bakersfield game, losing to Bakersfield College, 50-28.

Cerritos has one other post-season bowl game in the record books — a 21-12 loss to Arlington, Texas, in the 1957 Junior Rose Bowl.

The Falcons won the Metro title and Potato Bowl invitation in convincing style Saturday night, handing Long Beach its first defeat in 20 games.

Harbor Travels To Santa Maria

Harbor College plays Reedley in the Lions Bowl, Saturday night in Santa Maria, 8 p.m.

The game pits the Seahawks against the Champions of the Central Conference and a squad rated 17th in the nation. Harbor is ranked 15th in the latest national polls.

Both teams have a 7-2 record with Reedley losing to Monterey and College of Sequoias. In its last game of the season Reedley pounded out a 76-0 win over Antelope Valley. Harbor's biggest win was a 73-14 victory over Santa Barbara.

The Seahawks wound up in a tie for second place in Western State Conference play with Glendale. Each was 5-2. Ventura was 6-1, its only loss coming at the hands of Glendale.

ALL-METRO TEAM

Camino's Eber Player of Year

End Rick Eber has become the first football player in the history of El Camino College to be named the Metropolitan Conference "player of the year."

Eber, the receiving end of one of the most deadly passing combinations in conference history, hauled in 10 touchdown catches this season and had 52 receptions for 1006 yards.

His passing mate, quarterback Carey Hubert, also was named to the first team along with guard Ron Murray. Hubert completed 93 of 158 passes for 1512 yards and 17 TDs. Metro champion Cerritos, pitted against Boise, Ida., Saturday in the Potato Bowl at Bakersfield, placed guard Dennis Born on the first team.

Long Beach, runner-up in the conference and scheduled to battle City College of San Francisco in the Prune Bowl Saturday at San Jose, had five players on the first team. They were rushing leader Marv Motley (823 yards in 129 carries for a 6.42 average), center Rich Van Winkle, tackle Don Sam, end Ron Drake, and fullback Elwood Stewart.
