Placement Office at EC Active

Jobs ranging from accountants to pianists through zoology tutors are all available through the El Camino College Placement Office for students (non-graduates) and graduate alumni of the college.

The placement office, which has been in operation since the fall of 1956, handles more than 4,000 student applications each semester. More than 3,000 referral cards for either full or part-time employment are usually given to qualified students as an introduction to the employer each term.

Mrs. Alma Spector, placement clerk, finds that full-time positions are always difficult to fill at the beginning of a semester. Many of the full-time posts require too much experience for the El Camino student who is available for full-time work.

New Signal Now Working At College

A new traffic signal to increase safety for El Camino students and visitors is now in operation on Crenshaw Boulevard midway between Redondo Beach and Manhattan Beach boulevards.

Sea Bees Plan for Expansion

The Sea Bees Special Rating program of the Naval Reserve Construction Battalions has been expanded to meet the increased need for military forces and equipment.

The expanded program means qualified men who have never served in the Armed Forces may become part of the select group of U. S. Navy craftsmen.

Qualified applicants must now be earning a livelihood in the trade which is applicable to the Navy rating. He must be at least 26 years of age, but prior military service is not necessary.

ALTHOUGH NOT as difficult to fill as full-time positions, part-time jobs offer problems in the areas of both hours and salary. Most students are available for late afternoon and evening hours, but many employers require help for a minimum of four hours between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Jobs which pay less than \$1.50 per hour, such as restaurant, general helper and delivery jobs, often go unfilled.

"However, these minor problems in no way offset the benefits received by students and employers utilizing the placement office," Mrs. Spector explained.

"The fact that we process more than 3,000 applicants a semester is a good indication of the service the office renders the community," she added.
