

# Torrance Crime Rate Increases

Significant increases in nearly all categories of crime indexed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation have increased in Torrance in the past nine months.

Director J. Edgar Hoover said. The 11 western states topped the nation with an 11 per cent increase, Hoover reported.

## Motorists Cautioned By Chace

With the holiday season at hand, Supervisor Chairman Burton W. Chace today urged Los Angeles County motorists to drive with extreme caution.

Traffic tolls are rising daily and it is doubly important to be especially alert during heavy holiday traffic, Chace said.

"The life you save might well be your own!" Supervisor Chace said he is issuing the traffic warning at this time because inclement weather makes driving an added hazard.

RAIN-SWEPT streets, he warned, are slippery and dangerous. Visibility is impaired by rain-sloshed windshields and for pedestrians huddling under umbrellas.

For these reasons, Chace said, it is recommended that pedestrians wear light-colored clothing when out at night so they are more visible crossing streets.

In issuing the holiday reminder, Chace also urged motorists to observe highway safety striping, particularly on rainy or foggy nights.

"INCLEMENT weather adds to the problem of safe visibility, and all of us are indebted to a prominent Southern Californian, the late Dudley Pottenger, who in 1924 pioneered safety striping on Southland streets and highways," the supervisor recalled.

The first use of painted stripes in the area was along a portion of Long Beach Boulevard near South Gate, and this trial led to the present policy of providing safety striping on major streets and highways.

"We must strive to make this the safest holiday season in Los Angeles County history," Chace added. "To do this will require the cooperation and safe driving of each of us."

## Renew Driver's License Before 1st and Add Year

Will your driver's license expire in the next six months?

If so, you may be able to get an extra year added to your license term if you renew your license before the first of the year, according to Manager Charles W. Creighton of the Torrance Department of Motor Vehicles.

Creighton explains that the 1965 Legislature passed a law reducing the term of licenses from five to four years for renewal applicants. DMV will put the law into effect Jan. 1.

"We are able to renew a person's license anytime within six months before its expiration," Creighton said. "So a person with a license expiring in April could come in now and be issued a five year license expiring in April, 1971."

DMV estimates that more than a million California drivers' licenses will expire in the next six months, and can be renewed immediately. Licenses cannot be renewed more than six months early.

However, persons with poor driving records and all first-time applicants for a California license will receive a three-year license, regardless of the date they apply. Late renewal of licenses also results in three-year terms.
