### Firm Aid Hawthorne Extension

Extension of Hawthorne Boulevard between Newton Street and Palos Verdes Drive North, to be commemorated at ribbon-cutting ceremonies at 11 a.m. Friday, was assisted by donations of land and cash totaling more than \$100,000 from Great Lakes Carbon Corporation and its subsidiary, Great Lakes Properties, Inc.

The two companies gave 3.5 acres of land to Rolling Hills Estates plus \$40,000 to help the city acquire right of way. Rolling Hills Estates contributed \$20,000 from city funds. The money and land were in turn given to the County for the highway project.

In addition to these contributions, Torrance gave \$145,000. The County bore the remaining costs of the improvement.

This newest extension completes a plan to improve Hawthorne Boulevard as a major thoroughfare across Palos Verdes Peninsula. Sharing in development costs of the entire project were Palos Verdes Properties, Inc. and Transamerica Development Co.; the County of Los Angeles, and local governmental agencies.

### New City School Named for Levy

Torrance school board members formally named an elementary school to be built in south-central Torrance for the late Sam Levy at their meeting Monday.

The school, now being planned, will be known as Sam Levy Elementary School. It has been designated as the Tract 2200 School during the planning stages and will be located on Madison Street at 230th Street.

Trustee Bert M. Lynn had asked the board to consider naming a school for the late Mr. Levy because of the contributions he made to the city during his lifetime.

Mrs. Kenneth E. Watts, board president, suggested the Tract 2200 school because its graduates will attend Torrance High School in the downtown area with which Mr. Levy was strongly identified.

A pioneer businessman and merchant in the city, Mr. Levy came to Torrance in 1919. He died here last Oct. 30 after he sustained a heart attack.

He was active in a variety of organizations and community endeavors, including Little Company of Mary Hospital, the Torrance YWCA, Red Cross, Community Chest, City of Hope, and other community causes.

Mr. Levy received the Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Citizen's Award for 1956 and was instrumental in establishing the Torrance Unified School District in 1947.

Construction of the new Levy Elementary School is expected to begin early next year and will be completed in time for classes in the spring of 1967.

(Continued from Page 1) where noise and traffic will be considerable. "I can't believe this is going to be as bad as the monster that has been created," Ken Miller said.

A BRIEF negotiation conducted in an adjoining room failed to produce any meeting of minds on the question and the council repealed the ordinance. Mayor Albert Isen and Councilmen Ross A. Sciarrotta Sr. both cast "reluctant yeases."

"It's a crying shame — and I'm crying — to have to approve a \$400,000 structure when a \$2.5 million building is possible," Isen commented.

He added that he was "honor bound" to vote for repeal of the moratorium since the two weeks had produced no notable change in the situation. "It's simply wasting good frontage," Beasley said. "I agree," said Councilman H. Ted Olson commented, "but it's a matter of principle."

Plans for the convalescent hospital have been in the city's building department for several weeks and all changed have been completed. A building permit is expected to be issued some time today.

### IN OTHER ACTION, the council:

- Approved the rezoning of land adjacent to the southern city boundary and Hawthorne Boulevard from A-1 to C-3. The new zone is subject to a precise plan of development.
- Denied, on rehearing, amendments to precise plans of development for the northeast corner of Anza Avenue and Sepulveda and the southeast corner of Anza and Torrance Boulevard. Both amendments, sought by Shell Oil Co., would have permitted a market in the shopping areas.

• Held for two weeks: action on an ordinance to create a Parking Place Commission to govern the newly opened parking lots in downtown Torrance. The commission is required under state law.

- Renewed for one year a lease for the Pacific Coast Little League. The little league uses a field located on Torrance Municipal Airport property.
- Appointed a four-man committee to meet with officials from Redondo Beach to discuss the proposed beautification and modernization of the Riviera Village shopping district. Committee members include Councilmen George Vico, Mayor Albert Isen, City Treasurer Thomas Rupert, and Planning Commission President David B. Halstead.
