Reception Sunday To Salute Priest

The 10th anniversary of the Rev. Hugh R. Percy as rector of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church was officially noted by the City Council last night in a resolution congratulating the priest and expressing gratitude for his contributions to the welfare of the city.

Father Percy, who conducted his first service at St. Andrew's on Dec. 11, 1955, will be honored by members of the parish and friends in the community Sunday a reception in the parish hall beginning at 1:30 p.m.

THE CITY Council resolution cited his record of ministry here, pointing up that the St. Andrew's parish grew from 200 to 600 families during the 10-year period. The city's congratulatory message also recognized his community contributions through his activities as secretary and chairman of the Torrance Traffic Safety Council, and as secretary-treasurer and president of the Torrance Ministerial Association.

"I still have a strong sense of obligation to the community in these areas," Father Percy said about his community activities.

THE REV. FR. Percy came to Torrance from St. Paul's church in Winnipeg, Canada, a post he had held for 10 1/2

years. He was ordained as a priest in June, 1935, and was given a trip to the Holy Land by St. Andrew's when he celebrated his 25th Anniversary her five years ago.

"I have felt a deep sense of privilege to serve here, to grow up with a growing community," the rector told the Press-Herald yesterday. Torrance population has grown from about 60,000 to more than 130,000 during his tenure here.

"I HAVE been stimulated by the challenge of a church in the metropolitan area and the tremendous increase in opportunities for personal counseling, in the home, hospitals, and in church," he said.

In connection with his counseling, the rector attended USC taking courses in philosophy and psychology. He also took courses dealing with the New Testament which "enable me to interpret better this vital part of our Bible."

The church property at 1432 Engracia Ave. has been enlarged twice during the 10-year period of his ministry.


A BUILDING program in 1957 doubled the seating capacity by construction of additions to each side of the main sanctuary. In 1962 a second addition added Sunday School classrooms, a general sacristy and priest's sacristy. Rearrangement of interior space also permitted the establishment of a chapel and side altar in the 1962 program.

More than \$65,000 in memorial and special gifts were made during the church expansion programs, Father Percy said.

Confirmation classes conducted each year have prepared a total of 503 persons for presentation to the Bishop. Another 50 will be presented next February. In addition to these, 569 persons have been brought into the church through baptism in the 10-year period.

The rector and his wife, Vivian, have two children, Mrs. Charlotte Saulsbury, and Timothy Percy.

Contest Set By Council

Plans for an essay contest sponsored by the Torrance Beautiful Commission were approved by the City Council last night.

Members of the commission are expected to select a theme and set deadlines for the contest at their next meeting.

The contest, which has been sponsored annually for the past several years, will be open to all high school students in the city. Entries will, however, be limited to 10 from each grade at any specific high school.

Essays must not exceed 500 words in length and will be on some aspect of community beautification.

First and second place awards will be presented to the winning essays from each school and a perpetual trophy will be given to the school attended by a sweepstakes winner in city-wide judging.

A high school which wins the trophy for three consecutive years will be given permanent possession of the trophy.
