

Torrance, South Will Clash Tuesday

Basketball Teams Open Tournament

Unbeaten Torrance (10-0) and South (3-5) clash in the future game of the opening round of the Bishop Montgomery Basketball Tournament Tuesday. Their game is at 7 p.m., followed by the Montgomery-West High contest at 8:30 p.m.

The opening pairings also call for Pater Noster to play St. Anthony's of Long Beach at 4 p.m. and Rolling Hills versus Fermin Lasuen at 5:30 p.m.

Torrance's winning combination of Rich Kreul, Bill Doyle, Fred Carpenter, Robin Fisher and Richard Thompson is expected to be bolstered by the return to full strength of Bart Johnson.

South is also gradually regaining its prestige starting combination of Mark Sleeth, nursing a broken nose; Steve Kuchenbecker, ankle casualty; Chuck Fernandes, shoulder separation; and healthy Ed Holmes, Joe Miller and Jim Conroy.

Both Torrance and South are potential league headliners. Torrance is the choice of the Sky League and South is defender of the No. 2 spot in the Bay League.

Fermin Lasuen, favorite in the Camino League is the darkhorse entry in the Montgomery Tourney.

Torrance's Johnson was named "player of the tournament" in the Pacific Shores Tournament and Fred Carpenter got the same honor in the Beverly Hills Tournament.

The All-Tournament second team included Honigmann of Redondo, Ralph Punaro of Beverly Hills, John Anderson of Mira Costa, Ken Roberts of Ventura, and Bob Becker of North.

North took fifth place in the tournament and Mira Costa defeated Beverly Hills for third place.

The Tartar victory, 10th of the season without a loss, was all the more impressive because superstar Bart Johnson saw only limited action until Saturday's finale.



Dodgers Schedule Busy Spring Training Camp

Variety will be the spice of life for the World Champion Los Angeles Dodgers during their 1966 Spring Training maneuvers.

They'll play 13 major league teams a total of 27 games. These meetings will take place in Florida, Texas, Georgia, Arizona and California.

Just for good measure the Dodgers will play a game against an All-Star team from their minor league system—by way of saying farewell to Dodgerstown, Vero Beach, Fla., March 31.

When they return to Dodger Stadium for a week-end before the opening of the season, the Dodgers and Cleveland Indians will put together a club to meet the University of Southern California Trojans Saturday evening, April 9.

The second of two games that night, at 8 o'clock, the Dodgers and Indians will clash in the first of two week-end games. They also meet in Sunday afternoon. The Dodgers remain in Los Angeles to open the season with the Houston Astros.

Skipper Walt Alton will assemble his defending champions in Vero Beach the last weekend in February and the first exhibition game will be played on Saturday, March 12. This year's opener will be at West Palm Beach against the Atlanta Braves who'll visit Vero Beach the following day as part of a home-and-home arrangement.

They play a total of six games, two in Miami, one each in Houston, Atlanta, San Diego and Los Angeles. This year the Cleveland Indians, who usually finish with the Giants, will play the Dodgers five games. The Dodgers also play three games with the Giants during their final tune-up week.

There will be five games played on the Dodgers home base—Holman Field, Dodgerstown, Vero Beach—the Braves on March 13; the Yankees Wednesday, March 16; the Cardinals Wednesday, March 23; the Reds Wednesday, March 30, and the Dodger-town All-Stars the following day.

There will be only one spring training meeting between the two 1965 World Series combatants. The Dodgers and the American League champions Minnesota Twins will renew activities on Joe Tinker Field, Orlando, Fla., March 29.

Dodger players should not become bored with their spring chores. They will be given enough traveling to enliven their pre-season activities. In addition to daily flights in their Electra II in Florida, they'll fly to Houston for the weekend of March 19-20, to Atlanta for the weekend of March 26-27, to Arizona (Mesa and Phoenix) for the weekend of April 2-3 and to San Diego and Los Angeles for the final game of the Spring.

Construction Nears For College Stadium

The University of Santa Barbara should open its football season on campus next fall. A 15,000 seat stadium is set for construction early next year.

Announcement of the new field was made last week by Chancellor Vernon I. Cheadle following a meeting in Los Angeles by the Regents of the University of California.

The interim football and multi-purpose field and bleacher facility will be located directly north of the baseball diamond.

The project will provide a turf football field, demountable steel bleacher seating and locker-dressing room structure. The field will be lighted for night use.

Athletic director and head football coach Jack Curtice applauded the measure, calling it "another milestone in the development of our program. This is a wonderful thing for our students who now can enjoy on-campus football, and we of course still look forward to the fine community support which we have enjoyed over the years."

Chancellor Cheadle said in addition to football and other inter-collegiate sports, the facility would be used for such campus-wide events as fresh camp, commencement, spring sing and other important occasions drawing large crowds.

The campus has a pressing need for expansion of outdoor facilities, Chancellor Cheadle explained. "The present campus development in this area was designed for an enrollment of 3,400 students. Next year the student population will exceed 10,000 and we must increase the existing facilities."
