 "If you want to develop the land you can go right ahead. I am going to proceed very slowly."
 "But if you want a vote to-night, I'll vote," Olson added.
 Councilmen voted 6-0 to deny the request, with J. A. Beasley abstaining. He resides in the New Horizons development, adjacent to the proposed cemetery.

IN AN EARLIER hearing, the council unanimously voted to rezone a large lot at 2043 and 2049 W. 182nd St. from R-3 to R-2.
 The action, sought by the North East Torrance Homeowners Association, eliminates the only R-3 zone on the north side of 182nd Street between Van Ness Avenue and the eastern city boundary.
 Attorney Donald Hitchcock, representing Mrs. Hester

Dale, argued the action would devalue the property and deny Mrs. Dale her rights to develop the land. He said nearly \$12,000 had been spent on plans for a 20-unit apartment complex.
HOMEOWNERS, represented by President Bill Gaugh of 18206 Taylor Court, contended the R-3 zone is "spot zoning" and asked that it be rezoned to conform with other properties in the area.
 Councilmen heard evidence for nearly two hours before closing the hearing and approving the R-2 zoning.

Pound Asks Leash Law Be Obeyed

One of the basic requirements for dog ownership in the unincorporated area of the county and within those cities contracting with the county for Pound services is that his dog is maintained on his premises at all times, except when on a leash and in the charge of a competent person. Basically this provision was included in the ordinance for the protection of persons and property jeopardized by the dog that is allowed to run at large causing traffic hazards, destroying property, spreading diseases such as rabies, and, in the case of the biting animal, inflicting personal injury.
 In addition to the damage or problems that are created by dogs that are allowed to run at large, an owner is subjecting his pet to a great deal of danger. This is especially so in areas where traffic is heavy.
 For the protection of the children and residents of the area, as well as for the safety of your pets, the Pound asks for the help and cooperation of all dog owners in abiding by the leashing ordinance.
