Area Schools Schedule Mid-Year Graduations

More than 23,000 students will be graduated from the Los Angeles City Schools during winter rites Jan. 27 and 28, according to Jack P. Crowther, superintendent of schools.

The students will be graduated from 128 junior and senior high schools and junior colleges.

Locally, all Los Angeles junior and senior high schools have scheduled graduation exercises for Friday, Jan. 28.

FORMAL graduation exercises will not be held in the elementary schools, although nearly 15,000 students will be promoted to junior high school during the spring term.

Exercises are scheduled at 10 a.m. at Alexander Fleming Junior High with Warren Juhnke, principal, presiding. Juhnke and vice principals Mrs. Ruth Ware and Roger Caukin will present diplomas. A total of 146 Fleming students will receive diplomas.

Stephen M. White Junior High also will hold exercises at 10 a.m. Diplomas will be presented by Albert Cartwright, principal, and vice principals Mrs. Clara Vi-

ronda and Donald Hahn to 172 students.

WILMINGTON Junior High exercises are scheduled at 11:15 a.m. A total of 260 students will receive diplomas from Dr. Thelma Barnes, principal, and vice principals Mrs. Betty Malby and James Hampson.

Bernard J. Donahue and Sidney Brickman will present diplomas to 120 Carson High graduates at 8 p.m. Students will be the featured speakers. Donahue, principal of Carson, said exercises will be held in the gymnasium.
