Little Company of Mary Hospital Auxiliary presented awards to its volunteers and installed new officers for the coming year at a luncheon Wednesday, Jan. 12, at the Hunting Horn restaurant.

Senior volunteers served a total of 27,500 hours during 1965 and since the beginning of the auxiliary in 1959 members have served over 1,265,038 hours, Mrs. Robert Brown, chairman of hours, reported.

Sister M. Barbara, honorary president, presented the awards, assisted by Mrs. Brown.

Gold pins, inscribed with the hospital name, were presented to 42 members for serving 100 hours or more. Gold guards to attach to the pins, signifying 500 or more hours, were received by 16 members.

Members who have served 1,000 or more hours were capped. Little Company of Mary Hospital in Torrance is the first of the 46 hospitals of the order, ringing the world, to initiate the capping ceremony for its volunteers. Sister M. Patricia, hospital administrator, approved the design and promotion of the program for the first time last year.

The highest award and president's pin, a gold emblem with a diamond, decorated with a gavel, was presented to Mrs. George Olivieri, retiring president.
