

Job Corps Interviews Begin Here

An intensive recruiting campaign for Job Corps trainees has been started by the Torrance office of the California State Employment Service, Mrs. June Roper, manager, announced today.

Mrs. Roper said the Torrance area has been allocated a "substantial share of California's annual quota" for the Job Corps program.

Job Corps candidates enter a program of basic education, skill training and individual study, recreation, and physical activities to prepare themselves for jobs in an increasingly technical age, Mrs. Roper explained.

THE JOB CORPSMEN will live in a Job Corps center in California and other states with people their own age. They will attend classes, and follow courses of individual instruction in close contact with professional teachers and counselors.

On completion of their training, they will be assisted in their job seeking efforts through Job Corps contacts and private employers and the State Employment Service offices.

APPLICANTS MUST be citizens or legal residents of the U.S., between the ages of 16 and 21, and must not be attending full-time trade school or college. Candidates must have had some problem in finding employment, either because of a lack of qualifications for the existing job openings, or because of trouble finding and holding suitable permanent employment.

MRS. ROPER said any interested youth who meets the standards and is interested in becoming equipped with a more sizeable skill through the Job Corps program should contact the local office of the California State Employment Service, 1016 Sartori Ave., and ask for the Job Corps interviewer.

Law School Funds

USC Names Long Beach Attorney to Head Drive

Joseph A. Ball, Long Beach attorney with a long record of public service, is heading a campaign to raise \$2,700,000 for the University of Southern California Law Center, from which he was graduated nearly 39 years ago.

The money, being sought from USC's 5,000 Law alumni, will build a new building behind the present structure, which was erected in 1925, and provide the Law Center with a new library, seminar rooms, classrooms, study rooms, institute and research facilities, and faculty offices. The current Law building will also be remodeled and renovated.

Ball will serve as chairman of an alumni committee for the over-all Project for Excellence in Law and will soon appoint several attorneys as chairmen of committees for various areas of southern California.

FIFTY PER CENT of the judges and 26 per cent of the lawyers in Los Angeles County are graduates of the USC Law Center, which has been serving the community since 1904, according to Dean Orrin B. Evans.

Three programs of undergraduate instruction leading to the Bachelor of Laws degree give USC the most diverse, flexible curriculum of any American law school. It also has the largest graduate program in the West and one of the largest in the nation. The 100,000-volume USC law library, to which several thousand books are added each year, is housed in a building designed for only 15,000 volumes with expansion provided to accommodate 50,000, Ball pointed out in explaining a part of the

urgency of the fund-raising drive.

"We MUST have a library capable of housing 200,000 volumes and designed to permit future growth," Ball said. "To staff the projected Law Center, we will need to double the faculty from 12 to 25, assisted by researchers and secretaries. Extensive remodeling and renovation of the present building will be required to provide proper classrooms, study halls and seminar rooms."

"In 1925 the prevailing concept of legal education, which is reflected in the existing building, was one of a small resident faculty and large lecture halls."

"WE NOW project a school of large faculty and small classes in which the students are active participants, can give-and-take with the instructors and between themselves and can conduct extensive seminar work."

Ball's career was highlighted in 1964 when he served as Senior Counsel to the Warren Commission investigating the assassination of President Kennedy.

The Long Beach attorney is also on the Advisory Committee on Federal Criminal Rules and the Commission to Revise the California State Constitution.

HE IS ALSO a member of the California Law Revision Commission, is a past president of the National Conference of Bar Presidents, and a former president of the Long Beach Bar Association and the State Bar of California.

Ball is a member of the Board of Regents of the

American College of Trial Lawyers, and on the Committee to Revise California Criminal Jury Instructions.

He is a former trustee of the Los Angeles County Bar Association, a State delegate to the American Bar Association, a member of Legion Lex, support group for the USC Law Center, and a member of the President's Circle at USC.

BALL TEACHES a class in criminal law and procedure in the USC Law Center's graduate and advanced professional program for practicing attorneys.

He earned his undergraduate degree at Creighton University in Omaha in 1925, and his Bachelor of Laws degree from USC in 1927. His daughter, Patricia, was graduated in sociology from USC in 1958, and attended the School of Social Work in 1961-63.
