

... Let's Go

The Vatican has always held a particular fascination for me since I learned that it is in itself a City State and yet rests in the middle of Rome. What a strange arrangement — but probably most beneficial to the Vatican. Popes throughout the ages have played a major role in shaping the course of history.

It is indeed the smallest independent state in the world. It consists mainly of one hundred and eight acres, all enclosed by a high brick wall. The Papacy also owns the summer palace at Castel Gandolfo, in the Alban Hills, and a few properties in and near Rome.

The Castel Gandolfo is about fifty miles outside of Rome — and in a picturesque setting. In 1959 I took my travel group there to have an audience with Pope John XXIII. It was a rare experience. The crowd treated him as we would an All-American Quarterback — of course they loved him and showed it in every way. His informality helped break the "ice" that has prevailed in the Vatican for centuries.

The collection represents almost the entire history of art, but the works the Pope seems to favor are from the modern and primitive periods. He commissioned modern art for his private chapel and invited the artists to be present at the first service to be held in it. These austere modern and primitive works under the ornate ceilings have a spiritual simplicity that seems more powerful than all the tapestries and paintings of the Renaissance surrounding them.

Without a doubt, the Sixtine Chapel is still the greatest art work in the Vatican. I have seen it several times — but never without a tremendous crowd of gasping on-lookers. The walk to get into the narrow door of the Sixtine is so tiring that one almost has to lie down on his back to rest and enjoy the breathtaking span across the ceiling — at least that is what I had to do the first time I managed to fight my way in.

THE VATICAN City State is a relatively self-sufficient community. Its resident population today has been reduced to 400, but every morning more than a thousand people come through the Bronze Door, the Arch of the Bells and The Gate of Saint Anne to work in it. Supplies are brought in by train to its marble-faced railroad station.

The Vatican is a free port, such as most European airports are. Its employees buy tax-free food in the commissary and fuel at the gasoline pumps. A bank in the Palace handles the Vatican's accounts. The Central Post and Telegraph Office maintains three branches for the benefit of tourists — one on the roof of Saint Peter's, another at the exit of the Crypt and a third in the right arm of the Bernini Colonnade.

A newspaper, L'Osservatore Romano, publishes a semi-official view of the news for an international readership. Other facilities include a new garage to service cars and trucks, an apartment house for some employees, barracks for the Swiss Guard and the official Vatican heliport, a firestation, several office buildings, a mosaic workshop, a marble cutter's establishment, and even a parish church, Saint Annes!




