IN OTHER action last night, the council:

• Authorized the establishment of a Central Records Division under the supervision of the City Clerk's office and appropriated \$5,000 for a preliminary study. The study will be made by Gamlin Industries, a consultant firm, during the next six months.

• Adopted a resolution seeking \$7,000 in state funds for engineering work on Maple Avenue. The project involves the portion of Maple Avenue between Monterey Street and Sepulveda Boulevard.

• Referred to the Planning Commission a request for a change of zone from M-1 to R-3 on property located on Spencer Street between Anza Avenue and Earl Street. The commission was ordered to complete its study within 90 days.

• Approved a change of zone from A-1 to C-2 for property located between the newly completed section of Hawthorne Boulevard and the southern city boundary. The land is owned by Dan E. Butcher, who sought the change of zone.

Alfred G. Cagle, a prominent Torrance attorney, has been elected president of the Torrance Democrats, Associated. He succeeds Robert White.

Other officers of the group include Gordon C. Phillips, vice president; John Billings, secretary, and Roger West, treasurer.

Cagle, a resident of the city for the past 10 years, is a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Torrance Elks Club, the Torrance Family YMCA, and the South Bay Bar Association. He has served on the Torrance Beautiful Commission and currently is a member of the Citizens Advisory Committee for Community Improvement.

Born in Lone Wolf, Okla., Cagle came to California in 1935 with his family. He attended schools in Porterville, Calif., and moved to San Diego in 1948. He earned his law degree at Balboa University Law School in San Diego.

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


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
