## Voting on Bonds Slated Tuesday

Torrance voters will go to the polls next Tuesday to decide the fate of a \$12,500,000 bond issue earmarked for school construction. Bond moneys, if approved, would be used in a district-wide building campaign aimed at keeping a mushrooming school population off double sessions, according to Superintendent of Schools J. H. Hull.

Since present bond funds will be used up with the building of the Sam Levy and Grace Wright Elementary Schools this spring, more building funds are needed to keep pace with a student enrollment which is growing at the rate of 1,500 youngsters a year, school officials claim.

Approval of the bonds will not increase the tax rate because the amount of bonds which can be sold in one year is limited by law, the superintendent has said.

**PROJECTS** which would be financed by the bond issue include two new elementary schools, purchase of two new school sites, a vocational education center, additions at each of the four high schools, classroom additions at six elementary schools, construction of eight remedial reading classrooms, remodeling of administration buildings at 10 elementary schools, and additions to the district's central offices. Also included are construction of special classrooms for handicapped children and the addition of

storage facilities and conference rooms at all elementary schools.

West High School would gain a classroom building for 1,000 students, a student service center, a music building, and an auto shop. At Torrance High School a new library building is planned, the cafeteria would be enlarged and rehabilitated, the main building would be rehabilitated, and obsolete structures would be demolished.

**ADDITIONS** and alterations at North High School include a new classroom building, industrial arts building, enlargement of multipurpose building, and enlargement of bleacher seating and rest rooms. An in-

dustrial arts addition and expanded physical education facilities are planned for South High School.

At the present time every school in the district is filled to capacity. Dr. Hull said, "Every vacant classroom plus several cafeterias, music rooms, and storage closets were called into use last fall. Besides housing regular classes, the school district is providing remedial reading centers (in makeshift classrooms), absorbing a growing student enrollment which shows no sign of letting up, and is reducing class size in first, second and third grade to 30 students per class to comply with state law, the superintendent said.

A two-thirds majority is needed to pass the bond.
