

Alternate Offices Ready In Case of Nuclear War

Not much is heard about these days, but America's leading business corporations continue actively to set up alternate headquarters in areas offering relative safety from nuclear attack.

For instance, about 100 miles from New York City is Iron Mountain, which offers the protection of hundreds of tons of rock against blast heat and radiation in its hollowed-out core. Behind its massive multi-ton door lie offices, kitchens, dormitories, and communications centers. Some of the biggest of American firms have space here.

In the opinion of experts, virtually all of the 500 biggest corporations in America have taken steps of one kind or another to set up an alternate headquarters and many have even set up two, three, or more in widely separated areas.

SCIENCE NEWS — Recent establishments by the federal government of a new Institute for Oceanography is a step toward greater coordination of information concerning the sea, land and the atmosphere. One goal of the new Institute will be to give weathermen better information on which to base forecasts. . . . Television cameras are helping dock tankers for a leading U.S. oil company. Mounted on the 40-foot-high crow's nest, the cameras on each ship are controlled from the bridge. . . . Paralytics or those with amputated limbs who are confined to wheel chairs now can make use of an electronic control system mounted in their hats. The system propels the chair in any direction the rider nods his head. Proper head movements also bring the chair to a stop. . . . Available for oil drillers is a high speed drill

that penetrates rock formations by melting them. In hard basaltic rock the drills cut at a rate of 50 feet a day.

EXPANSIONS — The nation's booming economy has spurred increased appropriations for expansion of industrial productive facilities in 1966 and immediately beyond. Firms say they have to do it to meet the demands of goods and services.

Anticipation of such continuing growth in demand has caused Borg-Warner Corp. to schedule a record \$50-million spending program for this year, on top of \$45 million in 1965. Over the past five years the company's capital investment has totaled \$180 million, according to Chairman Robert S. Ingersoll. This year's Borg-Warner expansion will take place in the firm's Marbon Chemical

Division and its Calumet Steel Division. Marbon is expanding to increase production of its rubber and paint resin lines and to meet growing demand for its Cyclocal ABS plastic. Capacity of Calumet Steel will be boosted 50 per cent when its multi-million-dollar expansion is completed next year.

Chairman Ingersoll noted that this rise in capital outlay is "in keeping with Borg-Warner's growth pattern." Record sales and improved earnings for 1966 were recently forecast by Ingersoll, who said the order backlog was the highest on record.

AND IN RUBBER—A leading firm is backing its bright industry predictions for 1966 with \$100 million for new plants, expansion and modernization, new product lines and increased distribution around the world.

B. F. Goodrich, said its 1966 spending will be an increase of more than 70 per cent over 1965 capital expenditures of approximately \$58 million. Keener indicated that the record capital expenditures would be allocated in "nearly three equal parts" for growth in (1) tires, (2) chemicals, and (3) other product areas, including footwear, aerospace, defense and industrial products.

Of the total 1966 planned expenditures, approximately 80 per cent will be used for domestic operations, he said. A considerable portion of the funds for foreign operations will come from sources outside the U.S. The company recently formed an international finance corporation which has borrowed \$15 million abroad.
