Mrs. Mary Putnam, principal of Halldale Avenue elementary school, has accepted the post of Dean of Students for the spring semester around the world study cruise of Chapman College's floating campus, the M.S. Seven Seas.

She will be on leave from the Los Angeles City Schools for one semester.

Mr. Putnam will act as Assistant to the Executive Officer for the semester aboard ship.

On May 14, 1965, the University of the Seven Seas affiliated with Chapman College, at Orange, and as a result the academic program aboard the floating campus and all other aspects of the overseas program became an integral part of Chapman College as the Seven Seas Division, with full accreditation. This concept of a floating overseas campus is Chapman College's approach to a liberal arts curriculum in which students may gain as much as two semesters of credit while engaged in a unique experience in living and in studying and visiting in many countries and areas of the world.

Mr. and Mrs. Putnam participated in a Comparative Education seminar of study in Japan and Southeast Asia for two months during the past summer. This study tour was sponsored by the Delta Kappa Gamma Society, honorary leadership group for women in education.

Chapman College has invited three other people from this seminar to participate as faculty members. They are Dr. Catherine Reiser, chairman, History Department University of Pittsburgh, Johnstown Campus and Dr. and Mrs. Kelly from the University of Arizona.

The M.S. Seven Seas, operated by the Holland America Line, will put into 19 ports in the around-the-world-trip beginning with Paape, Tahiti, then to New Zealand, Australia, India, East Africa and the Mediterranean area.

Preparing for its Founders Day program, the PTA of Torrance's oldest school, Perry, located at 17813 Prairie Ave., is making an effort to contact all of its former students. Pictured is the entire school, grades 1 through 8 made Oct. 3, 1911. Anyone with identification of the students or teacher is asked to contact Mrs. Stephen Kleinbans (Lucille Terrence, a 1947 Perry graduate) or Mrs. Frederick O'Leary. The committee is also trying to obtain a roster of

all Perry students, prior to 1947, and this information is also asked so that they may be sent invitations to the Founders Day program. Perry School District was organized in 1905, six years before Torrance was founded. In 1913, when the Torrance Tract was opened, Perry had 32 pupils and two teachers. A nostalgic program has been planned with the Perry Place Players depicting the history of Perry.
