Six questions on issues of general public interest are included in Congressman Alphonzo Bell's monthly newsletter to voters in the 28th Congressional District.

Bell, a Republican, asks for views on the following questions:

- Do you support four-year terms for members of the House of Representatives?
- Do you support the Administration's decision to extend agricultural aid to Egypt?
- Do you believe the public has received adequate information about the Southeast Asia War?
- Do you believe increased defense spending should require decreased domestic spending?

Army Engineers to Study Point Fermin Cliff Area

A review investigation, asked by U.S. Senator Thomas H. Kuchel and wanted by Los Angeles city officials has been ordered by the Senate Public Works Committee into beach erosion and cliff deterioration in a waterfront section of Los Angeles harbor.

The Senate group adopted a resolution directing the Army Engineers to bring up to date studies conducted over a decade ago into conditions threatening an area the Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks hopes to develop for public use. The property is located in a shorefront segment long plagued by erosion and landslide known as the Point Fermin cliffs.

The action came after Kuchel, Assistant Republican

Leader of the Senate, advised the Public Works Committee that actual development planning requires current "engineering and scientific data and other information needed for and helpful in stabilizing and protecting the shores adjacent to the site."

How soon such an investigation might be started will depend, Kuchel noted, upon availability of money. He said the length of time taken for studies will depend upon various factors, including financing and manpower requirements.

Scott Steele has been installed as student body president for the spring semester at West High School.


Steele was re-elected to the office in balloting conducted at the end of the fall semester.
