

Arthur Stern Named New Magnavox Chief

Appointment of Arthur P. Stern as vice president-research and general manager of the Magnavox Research Laboratories in Torrance has been announced by Robert J. Brown, vice president and general operations manager of the government and industrial division of the Magnavox Company.

"In addition to his responsibilities for research and development efforts in image systems, space communications systems, avionics systems, and advanced communication techniques applicable to both government and industrial application, he said.

Stern joins Magnavox with broad technical and management experience in consumer, industrial, and defense fields. Brown said. His most recent assignment was as director of operations of the Defense Systems Division of the Bunker-Ramo Corp. in Canoga Park. He had served that firm earlier as director of engineering, and was director of engineering for the Martin Company in Baltimore.

AMONG HIS management credits cover fields of semiconductor technology, color television, microelectronics, undersea warfare developments, advanced communications techniques, and data processing.

He earned his masters degree in electrical engineering at Syracuse University and from the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology at Zurich, Switzerland. He received his bachelors work in electrical engineering at the University of Lausanne in Switzerland.

He is a member and officer in a number of professional groups and has been the author and coauthor of nearly 20 scientific and technical articles. He also holds several patents in the color television and semiconductor fields and has been honored for his contribution to solid state circuitry.

(Continued from Page 1) by from one city to another, and may travel all around the world as it did in the 1957 outbreak.

The spokesman stated that flu usually strikes suddenly, and is frequently accompanied by fever—especially in children and infants. Major symptoms are a sore throat and a general feeling of weakness.

The flu usually lasts for a few days, during which time the patient may experience muscular pains, abdominal pains, earache and headache; coughing and chills frequently accompany the condition.

TO TREAT the flu, doctors prescribe bed rest, simple foods and drinking abundant amounts of liquids. If the patient has a fever it is important to bring his temperature down. Since the disease is highly contagious, the patient should stay away from other people.
