Meeting Set Tomorrow

Rapid Transit League Topic

Rapid transit in Southern California, its background and possible future, will be the topic of Richard Manning, assistant to the general manager of the Southern California Rapid Transit District, at a meeting of the Torrance League of Women Voters tomorrow evening at 7:45 at the Culver Federal Savings and Loan, 700 S. Sepulveda Blvd., Manhattan Beach.

Manning will outline the rapid transit master plan which the SCRTD is preparing for consideration in Los Angeles County. The SCRTD plan would call for a dual-rail system, supplemented by a net work of feeder buses. Currently the SCRTD operates buses in four Southern California counties.

Prior to accepting his present position with

SCRTD, Manning was coordinator of student activities and administrative assistant to the dean at Los Angeles State College. He is a graduate of the internship in public affairs program of the Coro Foundation in San Francisco.

Mrs. Norman Greenman, League county study chairman, pointed out that the Thursday meeting will serve as background for later discussion meetings on rapid transit in Southern California. At these later meetings, alternate rapid transit plans, systems in other cities, and feasibility of the SCRTD plan will be discussed.
