

Career Center To Open

Students from four Torrance high schools will visit the fifth annual Career Guidance Center exhibition March 22, according to Dr. Bruce Wagner, curriculum consultant for the Torrance schools.

The Center is a project of the Office of the Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools and is designed to provide information on careers to young people. More than 100 associations, agencies, and industries will participate.

Displays will include materials on more than 500 different job titles.

The Center will be located at 2120 S. Eastern Ave., in the City of Commerce. It will be open from March 17 to 25, including Saturday and Sunday, from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. Evening hours are 7 until 10 p.m. on March 17, 18, and 24.

The Center is open to students and their parents without charge. More than 50,000 visitors are expected during the week-long exhibition. The Center may be reached via the Santa Ana Freeway and Atlantic Boulevard.

Chapel To Run Again

Charles Edward Chapel, one of the most colorful members of the California State Legislature, has announced he will become a candidate for re-election to the State Assembly this year.

Chapel has represented the 10th Assembly District, which includes the beach cities, Palos Verdes, Catalina Island, and portions of Torrance and other area cities, since 1951.

During that time, he has been an outspoken foe of Communism, socialism, and indecent literature.

THE VETERAN legislator also is known for his efforts to control air and water pollution and the traffic in narcotics. He also is noted for efforts to curb increases in taxes and to preserve property rights.

A native of Iowa, Chapel received his education at the University of Iowa, Missouri University, and the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md.

He held a commission in the United States Marine Corps until he was honorably retired in 1937.

CHAPEL'S main source of income for many years has been non-fiction books, dealing for the most part with aviation, the exploration of space, firearms, radio, and electronics.

He has served as a member of the Assembly committees on Revenue and Taxation, Public Utilities and Corporations, Transportation and Commerce, and Military and Veterans Affairs.

A Republican, he and wife, Dorothy, live in Palos Verdes Estates. They have four children.


