## Bids Sought For Lomita Post Office

Competitive bids for the construction of a new post office in Lomita currently are being sought by the Post Office Department.

Under the government's lease-construction program, the successful bidder will purchase property located on Narbonne Avenue, construct the building according to Post Office Department specifications, and lease the building to the Post Office Department for a basic period of 20 years. Options to renew the lease for an additional 30 years will be included.

The building will remain under private ownership, with the owner paying all local property taxes.


