Y Clubs Designed For Many

Clubs organized under the sponsorship of the Torrance Family YMCA are designed to offer something for everyone.

For the young 6 to 9 set, the Y-Indian Guides put the boy and his father together in a program and the Y-Indian Maidens comprise a neighborhood group for the girls and their mothers.

The Tri-Gray-Y for girls and the Gray-Y for boys between 9 and 12 provide an active program of development for youngsters. Each group often attends summer camping programs, and the boys make many weekend and longer camping hiking trips.

The Jr. Hi-Y clubs for boys and the Jr. Tri-Hi-Y clubs for girls cater to those between 12 and 14. These clubs offer more advanced programs of informal education and development in service, democratic actions, athletics, and other group projects.

The high school girls and boys are offered programs through the Tri-Hi-Y and the Hi-Y as well as a few coed clubs.
