Television Burglaries Show Gains

The intensity of television set burglaries in the South-west area, particularly Torrance, has multiplied greatly in the last couple of months, according to Lt. R. C. Wright, commander, Detective Division, of the Torrance Police Department.

"These daylight and early evening burglaries have been accomplished by entering residences while the victims were absent from their homes," said the lieutenant. "Entry has been made through unlocked doors and by smashing rear windows."

The Police Department requests that all citizens record the serial numbers of their television sets and other valuable appliances and keep the information in a safe place.

A request has been issued also that when any suspicious activity is observed around an unoccupied house or apartment that the police department be contacted and the license number of the vehicle being used recorded.

The California Highway Patrol has issued a call for applicants for the position of state traffic officer to meet its schedule for an expanded patrol.

According to Captain E. L. Greer, commander of the patrol's South Los Angeles area, applications for the position are available at the local office.

"The applications must be completed and filed no later than midnight, April 15," Captain Greer said, "since the statewide examination will be given on May 14."

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
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
